LOCAL NEWS.

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There was no City Court this morning.

Ice water was plentiful and cheap this morning.

The receipts of cotton at this port today foot up 184 bales.

Prof. Proctor is in Columbia where he lectures five evenings this week.

One white tramp was accommodated with lodgings at the guard house last night.

Br. brig *Ceredin*, Evans, from this port for Hamburg, was off Dover on the 8th inst.

Valentine Day is near at hand and the young folks are thronging the book-stores to make their purchases.

There is one capital case on the charge of burglary on the docket of the Criminal Court, to be tried at the present term.

Ger. barque *Alexandrine*, Riekels, cleared today for London with 4,117 barrels resin, valued at \$4,604, shipped by Messrs. Paterson, Downing & Co.

The Presbytery of Wilmington will hold its next meeting at Mount Olive, Duplin county, commencing on Wednesday before the second Sunday in March, at 7 1/2 P. M.

The thermometer indicated 18 degrees above zero in certain localities in the Eastern section of the city at sunrise this morning. It was very cold and people's noses, ears and woodpiles suffered in consequence.

The new steam fire engine for the Howard Relief Fire Engine Company was shipped on the Clyde Line steamer *Benfactor*, and is now somewhere between this port and New York. The steamer was due yesterday, but has undoubtedly met with her share of the heavy gales which have prevailed along the coast within the last week and has been delayed in consequence. She will probably arrive during the day.

Great Longevity.

Mr. Stephen L. French, brother of Mr. George R. French, of this city, died at his residence in Fall River, Mass., on Sunday morning last, aged nearly 82 years. It will be remembered by many that the deceased, with two other brothers from the North, were in this city last year on a visit to their brother, Mr. George R. French, and the remarkable longevity of the family was a subject of much interest. There are three brothers living; Asa, at East Marshfield, Mass., aged 85; George R., in this city, aged 83, and Job, at Fall River, Mass., aged 79; their united ages aggregating 247 years.

The New Hampshire Club.

This club arrived here at half past 11 o'clock this forenoon on a special train consisting of four Pullman palace cars, being several hours behind the schedule time. The party numbered 101 persons in all, among whom were Governor Hale and about 40 ladies. They left here at quarter past 1 o'clock this afternoon on their way to the New Orleans Exposition via Charleston, Savannah and Jacksonville, and will stop three days at the last named place. The club was organized in the Fall of 1880, and now has a membership numbering more than 400 and representing an aggregate capital of more than \$80,000,000. The President of the club is Hon. J. C. Moore, editor and proprietor of the *Manchester, N. H. Union*, and he is one of the best natured and best looking men in the party. They will return by the same route, and, while we earnestly hope that no accident may befall them, we would be glad if they could be induced to stop here for a few hours so as to have a better view of our city and its industries. They were a very agreeable body of ladies and gentlemen, fine representatives of the Granite State, and we would delight to become better acquainted with them.

Grand Lodge K of P.

We learn from the *Visitor* that the Grand Lodge Knights of Pythias of North Carolina assembled in session at Raleigh yesterday morning, at 10 o'clock, and was called to order by Grand Chancellor W. T. Hollomell, of Goldsboro.

Every lodge in the State was represented.

The reports of the Grand Keeper of Records and Seal and Grand Master of Exchequer show that the Grand Lodge and all of the subordinate lodges are in an exceedingly healthy condition, both as regards membership and finances. Most of the lodges have increased their membership and two new lodges have been instituted during the year.

The report of the Supreme Representative shows that the general growth of the order has been unprecedented, the membership now numbering over 140,000, with 40 grand lodges.

The Grand Chancellor appointed the standing committees, and the lodge then took a recess till 3 o'clock.

Suit for Damages.

Here is an item clipped from the *New York Sun*, which is of interest to many here. The lady alluded to is the wife of Dr. E. D. King, formerly a resident of this city:

Mrs. Henrietta H. D. King, of Wilmington, N. C., a sister of Prof. Ogden Doremus, was on the witness stand of the United States Circuit Court several hours yesterday, describing to Judge Shipman and a jury the injuries she says she suffered while alighting from a Broadway and Seventh avenue car on April 11, 1882. She signalled a car going down town. A car going up came between her and it. She stepped on the rear platform of the up-bound car to cross to the other car. She told the conductor to wait for her, and she was thrown to the ground and dragged some distance. She said she suffered injuries that have kept her under a doctor's treatment ever since. She seeks to recover \$25,000 from the company.

Prof. Doremus was a listener while she was testifying. He said "good" loud enough to be heard by the jury when the Judge overruled an objection to his sister's testimony. The Judge cautioned him not to repeat his remark.
