F. Powers was called to the Chair and Mr. A. E. Burton was requested to act as Secretary. Mr. Gibson James, by request of the Chair, explained the object of the meeting, and several short and appropriate speeches were made by some of those present in advocacy of the movement, at the conclusion of which, on motion of Mr. R Kinsey, a committee of three were appointed to draft resolutions expressive of the sense of the meeting. While the committee on resolutions were absent the Chairman of the meeting was called upon and addressed the people in an appropriate and earnest manner, after which the committee on resolutions returned and reported the following MONDAY, February 9th, preamble and resolutions:

WHEREAS, We, the citizens of Duplin. Pender and Onslow counties, baying been favored with legislative enactments for the construction of a public road across Angola Bay, in Duplin and Pender counties, and by the construction of the Quaker Bridge road, through portions of Onslow and Jones

Resolved, That we, the people of the eastern counties, have furnished convicts in sufficient numbers to reclaim many acres of our swamp lands which are now without value because of the abundance of water, and that we feel entitled to a reasonable proportion of

the convict labor. Resolved, That we suggest to the people of Croom's Bridge, Pender county, and of Tar Landing and The Stock Must be Sold. Catharine Lake, Onslow county, to concur with us in a petition, asking the Legislature to connect the road now being constructed across Angola Bay with the Quaker Bridge road in Ons-
