IN CONGRESS YESTERDAY.

SENATE.

WASHINGTON, February 11.—The Army Appropriation bill was reported and placed on the calendar. At five minutes before twelve o'clock a message was received announcing that the House of Representatives would, at 12 o'clock, be ready to receive the Senate in order that in joint convention both houses may count the electoral vote.

At 12:25 p. m. the Senators returned to the Senate chamber and the President pro tem, of the body having resumed the chair, the tellers on the part of the Senate—Messrs Hoar and Pettibone—appeared, and on their behalf, Mr. Hoar reported the result of the electoral count. When the tellers' report was completed the President of the Senate repeated verbatim the closing sentence of the announcement made by him in the House of Representatives relating to the declaration of the vote.
