In the French army the mortality in 1884 was, from accident 0.6 per 1,000 men; from disease it was 10.32.

The Sunday smoking "at homes" of the Portuguese Mini-ter are a leading social attraction at Berlin this winter.

A bronze bust of Lawrence Barrett as Cæsus—the work of the sculptor, Mr Hartley—has been presented to the Garrick Club, of London.

Senator Cameron has a new claim, to time. A box with six legs beneath and two above its body, and two tails, was born on his farm last week.

The foreign trade of France during 1884, imports \$905,193,400, and exports \$670,020,000. In 1883 the figures stood: Imports, \$960,869,800; and exports, \$690,374,400.

Massachusetts has netted \$3,335,693 from the sale of its Boston Back-bay lands; last year's sales amounted to \$51,714; and the value of the land unsold is put at \$130,000.

The enormous advantages of wise sanitation are becoming more and more widely appreciated. Serbia has sent a Commission to England to study up the latest sanitary methods.

The daily traffic receipts of the Suez canal show wide fluctuations. Here are the receipts of four consecutive days in December last: \$23,200, \$46,000, \$58,000 and \$30,600.

Now that it has been settled that the grand banquet at the inauguration is to cost only \$1 per plate, the people begin to believe that an era of Democratic simplicity is really about to begin.

Three hundred wooden images of saints, stolen from churches by Mexicans, were among the fuel purchases reported recently by a Mexican railway manager. He bought them for 50 cents apiece.

Many Southern railway companies have this year placed their old cross ties at the disposal of the Mayors of towns along the lines of their roads, to be distributed to deserving poor people for firewood.

St. Louis papers are asserting that there exists a ring to secure pardons in Missouri at prices ranging from a few hundred to a few thousand dollars, and that the late Governor Crittenden was concerned in the business.

The Clovis-Hugues affair has served to suggest a new cotillon figure, "Le Revolver des femmes Outrages," in which the lady, with a toy revolver loaded with perfume, shoots at the partner she selects.

The Tanner's Gazette of Vienna states that during the recent epidemic of cholera in Italy tanners were not attacked by the disease, and that the epidemic was less severe in towns containing tanneries.

Ex-Governor Cornell's name has been rejected by the Republican Enrolling Committee in New York, he having refused to answer the question: "Did you vote for the Republican electors for President?"

Mis Minnie Hauk, now singing in South Germany cities, accepted an invitation to sing in "Carmen" and "Lohengrin," at the Royal Opera, Berlin, during April. She will sing in concert in London, throughout next month and in opera at Copenhagen in May.

Some English snobs have been insulting Michael Davitt at Rome, refusing to sit at table with him, and finally compelling him to leave the hotel at which he had put up. This is very small and silly conduct for people who pretend to good breeding and common sense. Mr. Davitt is a man whose talents and sincerity have earned for him the respect of all thinking men and of such of his opponents as have brains.

A London lawyer suffered a long time from lead poisoning before the doctors discovered that it was owing to his use of snuff put up in so-called tin foil wrappers. According to the Medical Press there are now on record thirty-four cases of this kind. Some samples of moist snuff contained 2.50 per cent. of lead.

Carteret and Pender Courts.
By a recent act of the Legislature the time for holding the terms of the Superior Courts in Carteret and Pender counties has been changed, so that the former will be held in the time heretofore held by the latter and vice versa. The bill was introduced by Mr. J. T. Bland, representative from Pender county, and is as follows:

AN ACT TO CHANGE THE TIME OF HOLDING THE SUPERIOR COURTS IN THE COUNTIES OF CARTERET AND PENDER.
The General Assembly of North Carolina do enact:
Section 1. That to the end that the Superior Court of Carteret county shall be held at the time now designated for the holding of the Superior Court of Pender county and vice versa, section 910 of The Code be amended by striking out "Carteret" where it appears under the paragraph headed "Third Judicial District" and inserting "Pender," and by striking out "Pender" where it appears under said paragraph and inserting "Carteret."

Sec. 2 That all process, mesne or final, civil or criminal, issued and returnable, or which may be issued and returnable to the Spring Terms of the Superior Courts of the said counties shall be returnable to the next terms of said Courts as regulated by this act, and all persons who have been recognized, bound or summoned to appear at the next Superior Courts in said counties are hereby required to appear at the times prescribed by this act.
Sec. 3 That all laws and parts of laws in conflict with this act are hereby repealed.
Sec. 4 That this act shall be in force from and after its ratification.
Ratified this 7th day of February, A. D., 1885.
