Mr. Blackburn gives it out that the reports that Speaker Carlisle is seriously ill are unfounded. "You can say," said Mr. Blackburn "that he is suffering a great deal of pain, and that he will not be out for several days, but that his condition gives no concern to his friends." From other sources it is learned that Mr. Carlisle is suffering from an acute attack of sciatic rheumatism, which is complicated with kidney disorder.

Using round numbers, in the last twelve months the number of national banks has increased by 135, and the capital by \$12,200,000; the deposits have decreased by \$118,000,000, the loans have decreased by 73,000,000, the gold fund has increased by \$2,700,000, the gold Treasury certificates have increased by \$2,000,000, silver and silver certificates show a slight gain, and the greenback fund a gain of \$4,000,000.

A Social Event.

We clip the following from the Washington City correspondence of the Goldsboro Messenger:

The complimentary reception given by Mrs. Whitman, formerly of South Carolina, to Mrs. Pembroke Jones this afternoon was one of the social events of the season. The attendance was large, the toilets were brilliant, the number of distinguished persons present considerable, the table elegantly furnished, and the whole occasion most enjoyable. Among the North Carolinians at the reception was the returned Arctic voyager, Lieutenant Semly, of the U. S. Navy.

Anniversary Exercises.

On Thursday next, the 19th inst., Stonevall Lodge No. 1, K. of P., and Germania Lodge No. 4, K. of P., will jointly celebrate the 21st anniversary of the organization of the order by appropriate exercises at the Castle Hall of the latter Lodge. Interesting and instructive addresses will be made by eloquent speakers. This order has made wonderful progress in the 20 years of its existence and now has its subordinate lodges in nearly every village in the country where there are as many as 1,000 inhabitants, and it is now in a more prosperous condition than ever before.

The Trial To-Day.

The new steam fire engine *A. Adrian* was taken out this morning by the members of Howard Relief Fire Engine Company No. 1, and put to another and final test under the direction of Mr. T. Button, who is here for that purpose. She was taken first to the corner of Market and Seventh streets and subsequently to near the Carolina Central Depot, and at both places was severely tested as to her capacity and power. At the first named place the time consumed in getting up steam after the torch was applied was four minutes and 45 seconds. Her trials were entirely satisfactory to the members of the company and to all concerned, and she threw water to a considerable distance further than her guarantee called for. After her trial the company returned with the engine to the engine house, where a bountiful collation had been prepared for them and to which the gallant firemen and their invited guests did ample justice.

A Notable Life.

Capt E. R. Rice, of the the schooner *John A. Griffin* now in this port, has had an eventful life, a large portion of which has been quite intimately blended and identified with the history of Wilmington. He is now 55 years of age and has led a seafaring life for 45 years, or ever since he was 10 years old. He is a native of New Jersey, where he owns a valuable farm which is successfully cultivated by his children. His first voyage to sea, when a lad of 10 years, was from Philadelphia to Wilmington. Since then he has sailed in all sorts of vessels and has visited every quarter of the globe, and has had all the varied adventures of peril, exposure, heat, storm and hurricane which almost necessarily fall to the lot of sailors. He gave us the pleasure of a call this morning, and in the course of conversation informed us that he brought to this port the brick of which the Custom House was built and assisted in unloading them from the vessel. In the year 1848 he was here in a schooner and, after discharging her cargo, fitted the vessel with temporary berths and went to Point Peter, where she took in a lot of rice straw for bedding. The schooner was then dropped down the river to Smithville, where she took on board a part of a regiment of soldiers belonging to the command of Col. Wilson, of Edgecombe county, and took them to Mexico, without losing a man among the number, although some of them were so sick at the time of embarkation that they were brought on board the vessel in cots.

For the last few years he has sailed almost exclusively between Philadelphia and this port. His recent thrilling experience in being knocked overboard in a gale of wind, and his almost miraculous rescue through the indomitable pluck and many efforts of his son, an account of which we published at the time, is one of the notable events in his sailor life.

Personal.

Criminal Court.

The following have been the proceedings before this tribunal since the close of our last report:

State vs. J. J. Hopkins, assault and battery. Not guilty. Ordered that notice issue to J. F. Garrell and J. D. Sellars to show cause why they should not be marked as prosecutors and pay costs in the case.

State vs. J. J. Hopkins, concealed weapon. Not guilty and defendant discharged.

State vs. W. H. Freeman and Gabe Baker, affray. Guilty. Judgment one penny and costs.

State vs. J. C. Hill, embezzlement. Motion for new trial renewed. Case continued by consent.

State vs. George D. Reilly, assault and battery. Not guilty.

State vs. Fred Jones, slander. Not guilty and defendant discharged.

State vs. Charles Walker, assault and battery. Defendant submits. Judgment \$1 and costs.

Audit and Finance.

The Board met yesterday in regular session, present, R. J. Jones, Esq., Chairman, and O. A. Wiggins, W. R. Kenan and John S. McEachern. Sundry bills were audited and passed upon.

The action of the Board of Aldermen, allowing \$100 to J. R. Turrentine for damage done to his office by overflow of gutter during rain in March, 1884, was approved.

Also, the action of the Board of Aldermen, authorizing the committee on Markets and Fees to have a new floor placed in the Fourth street market house, was approved.

The action of the Board of Aldermen in reference to a communication from Mr. Wm. Latimer, asking for an extension of time in the matter of the purchase of the lot on Dock street for hotel purposes, was referred to a committee with power to act, consisting of Messrs. Calder, McEachern and Kenan.

The Board did not concur in the proposition of the Board of Aldermen to make an expenditure of \$100 towards the publication of Maj. W. L. Young's book, entitled "Semi-tropical Area."

Mr. Wiggins moved, and it was carried, that the Chairman be instructed to sign a note for \$7,000, at 8 per cent. per annum interest, being the renewal of a note dated Feb. 5th, 1884, given to the First National Bank and by it transferred to W. H. McRary. Said note was given for the improvement of North Water street [This makes notes to the amount of \$11,000 renewed this month for the above improvement.]
