All the wooden toothpicks are made in Maine, two firms controlling the business. The business is about 12,000 cases a year, 1,000 of them going to Europe and Mexico. Each case contains 250,000 picks. Some of the swell New York clubs have imported orange-wood picks and a flavored pick from Japan.

There are 103 colored men in Washington who are worth over \$25,000 each, fifty-two worth \$10,000 each and nearly 1,000 who pay taxes on \$5,000 each. Gen. W. Williams, ex-member of the Ohio Assembly and author of a history of the colored race, is worth \$40,000. Frederick Douglass has \$300,000 and now lives in and owns a house opposite Washington, formerly owned by a man who so hated the blacks that he refused to sell anything to one of them.

Carrara, Italy, furnishes the statuary and other better qualities of marble for the world; France of any other country being the greatest buyer. Six thousand men work in the quarries. They are hoisted 700 feet in the air and then horizontally to the level of the quarries, where they excavate the marble in as large blocks as possible, the larger the more valuable. Hundreds of fatal accidents occur every year. Children scarcely out of their swaddling clothes work amid the glare and dust and die with sore eyes and stifled lungs.

The production of pig iron in the United States in 1884 amounted to 4,559,613 tons. The output was 557,350 tons less than in 1883, but the unsold stock on hand on January 1, 1885, amounted to 593,000 tons, against 533,800 on January 1, 1884; and 429,694 tons on January 1, 1883. The only States showing an increase in production are Illinois and the States south of Kentucky, the principal gain being in Illinois. Those are also the only States which report relatively light stocks of unsold iron.

The Georgia papers are very severe in their strictures upon Emory Speer, who has recently been confirmed by the U. S. Senate for a Federal judgeship. Mr. Speer is just 36 years of age, and has served two terms in Congress. He is a brilliant, cultured gentleman, in features and person, as handsome as a picture and, perhaps, the finest stump speaker in the South. We once heard the late Ben. Hill present him to an Atlanta audience in the following language: "I take pleasure in introducing to you Mr. Emory Speer, a young man of whom you have heard something in the past and of whom you will hear much more in the future, but he is a little self-willed." The Democratic fogies of Georgia drove this aspiring young man out of their party because, like Pitt, his crime was that of being a young man. Speer is a brighter and better man than some of his traducers.

## LOCAL NEWS.

The receipts of cotton at this port to day foot up 235 bales. Who wants to be Alderman in my ward? is a topic of much interest now. To-day has given us a bountiful forecast of March weather. We have enough of it already.

The merchants here are busy in taking stock preparatory to their Spring migration Northward in search of new Spring goods. New River oysters are plentiful at \$1 per gallon and shad at 90 cents per pair but beef and mutton and chickens and eggs are scarce and high.

A colored girl, the nurse of Dr. A. H. Robbins, of Brunswick county, was badly burned a day or so ago. We were unable to learn particulars.

Mr. D. A. Beam brought a fine drove of mountain cattle to this market, this morning from Shelby. They are in good season to supply a long felt want.

Mr. John Dyer has a combination buggy, carriage and wagon; (either of the three at a moment's notice), which he will sell for \$50, including a fine set of Harness.

The truckers hereabouts complain very much of the cold weather. Some vegetation was up about ten days ago but it was cut off close to the ground by the cold.

The "foxers" were out in full force yesterday and spend the entire day in pursuit of roynard, but brought home no "brush." Refreshments were in order on their return.

Just eight days more and the reign of the pomp of Republican purple will be happily over, and there will be a return to Democratic principles and practices—honesty and simplicity.

We publish in full, on the second page of this issue, the bill which has recently become a law establishing the new Criminal Circuit of New Hanover and Mecklenburg counties.

There were exercises to-day at Union Graded School, on Sixth street, in celebration of Washington's birthday.—There were a number of visitors present and the exercises were very interesting to all.

**Criminal Court Officers.** A special to the DAILY REVIEW, from its good friend, Senator Chadbourn, announces that Governor Seales to-day appointed Hon. O. P. Meares as Judge of the new Criminal Circuit composed of New Hanover and Mecklenburg counties, and that the appointment was confirmed by the Senate. Dunham, were nominated by the Governor for the same positions in the New Hanover branch of the new court, and those appointments were also confirmed by the Senate.

**Fatal Accident.** An accident occurred last night at Union Depot, in this city, which resulted in the death of colored hand employed on the yard by the name of William Hicks. It was at half past 2 o'clock and Hicks and another employe, also colored, by the name of Archie Simms, were engaged in arranging the trucks for the transfer of a sleeper. They were both in the pit at the same time and had arranged the trucks but before they could well get out of the way the car was upon them. Simms did indeed manage to escape but Hicks was not so fortunate. He was caught by the car and frightfully crushed, both arms and both legs having been broken. He was taken out in horrible agony and died an hour and a half later, at 4 o'clock.

The unfortunate man hailed from South Carolina. He was unmarried and lived on Fourth, between Brunswick and Bladen streets, to which place his mangled remains were conveyed.
