City Court.

Spencer Stanford, colored, was the first case which was brought before the Mayor this morning. He was charged with being drunk and disorderly and a fine of \$5 was imposed for the offense.

The South Carolina Volunteers, a colored military organization of Charleston, S. C., 30 strong, accompanied by Brig. Gen. J. C. Claiborne, also colored, passed through this city at about half past 1 o'clock this morning, en route for Washington, D. C., where they will participate in the parade incident to President Cleveland's inauguration.

To-Day's Fire.

At about noon to-day the two-story frame dwelling on the corner of Bladen and Third streets, owned and occupied by Eyander McBryde, colored, was discovered to be on fire in the second story. The alarm was at once given and the firemen were quickly present, but owing to a great measure to the strong breeze that was blowing at the time the flames had gotten under such headway that the roof and upper story of the house were consumed.

We are requested to state that for a week to come the Rooms of the Wilmington Library Association will be open only in the day time and not at night, as the Librarian will go to Washington City to attend the inauguration of President Cleveland.

A Rough Joke.

County Commissioners.

The Board met in regular monthly session yesterday afternoon; present, H. A. Bagg, Esq., Chairman, and Commissioners Montgomery, Moore, and Pearce.

The Registrar of Deeds submitted his report of fees received from marriage licenses during the month of February, amounting to \$13.30, and exhibited the Treasurer's receipt for the same.

The chairman reported taxes collected from Martha J. Suttan for the years 1881 and 1882, amounting to \$41.35, and from Elyda M. Bell, by A. M. Rasberry, for the years 1881 and 1882, amounting to \$10.39, making a sum total of \$51.74, and exhibited the Treasurer's receipt for the same.

The following persons were granted licenses to retail vinous and malt liquors until the 1st of April, 1885: Robert Cobb and S. G. Westbrook; and L. R. Chadwick.

Parade and Reception.

It is a custom among the different white fire companies of the city to tender a reception to either of the organizations that shall receive a new engine or truck. It is a pleasant and laudable custom and one which shows markedly the spirit of fraternal good feeling that exists among the members of the different organizations composing the fire department in the city.

Postponed.

The lecture of Col. Sloan, which was announced for last night, was postponed by request, and will be delivered to-night at the rooms of the Wilmington Library Association. It will be an interesting lecture, and we hope that there may be a crowded house to give the speaker a cordial welcome.

Board of Aldermen.

The Board of Aldermen met in regular monthly session at the City Hall last night. Present, Mayor Hall, Aldermen DeRosset, Boney, Bear, Dudley, Mouton and Howe.

The committee on Lights, on the question of securing a system of electric lights, reported, that in consequence of the yet imperfect condition of the system established in several cities, and the largely-increased cost of the same, it is inexpedient to adopt any existing system of electric lighting for street purposes.

Alderman Dudley, from the Market Committee, reported that the clerk of the Front Street Market had been suspended by the Mayor and the Committee. The action had been sustained and the position declared vacant; whereupon Mr. G. W. Thames was unanimously elected to fill the vacancy.

On motion of Alderman DeRosset a resolution was adopted permitting property owners on Market street to remove and replant trees in one row in said street, with the assistance of the street force.

Resolved, That this Board, at its last regular meeting previous to the election of their successors, wishes to place upon record its appreciation of the dignified, impartial and courteous manner in which its presiding officer—Mayor Hall—has discharged the duties imposed on him, and unanimously tender him their heartfelt wishes for his future prosperity.

Speeches were made by several members of the Board, heartily endorsing the resolution, whereupon Mayor Hall responded as follows:

GENTLEMEN OF THE BOARD OF ALDERMEN:—The Clerk having reported that all business for your consideration has been disposed of, I trust you will pardon me for occupying a few minutes of your time. To-night we meet together as a Board of Aldermen, for the last time. Another regular meeting will bring together in this hall a new Board of Aldermen, representing the sovereign will of the people.

Resolved, That the thanks of this Board be returned to the clerk (Col. Jno. D. Taylor) for the efficient manner in which the affairs of his office have been conducted.

SECTION 1. That Chapter 305 of the laws of 1883, entitled an act to amend Section 5, Chapter 112 of the laws of 1876-1877, be amended by striking out in the 9th line of section one of said act the word "lot" and the words "number of block" and by inserting in lieu thereof the word "house".
