SENATE. FIFTIETH EAY.

Thursday, March 5, 1855 Lieu: enant Governor Stedman called

A message was received from the Governor, nominating J M. Betts and James J. Litchford as directors of the deaf, dumb and blind institution. The Senate went into executive session and confirmed the nominations.

The unfinished business, the bill providing for the relief of disabled soldiers, was taken up. An amendment was adopted that the amount appropriated shall not exceed \$30 000 per annum .-No one worth over \$500 shall receive anything. The bill passed third reading and was sent back to the House for concurrence in the amendment.

The special order was the bill relating to the State Board of Health (appropriating \$2,000, and providing that the board shall consist of six physicians and one civil engineer, that there shall be auxiliary boards in the counties, composed of the county surveyor and all legalized physicians, including those who have diplomas from any AN ANDAFTER March 6, 1885, at 5.20 reputable college). 


