According to conservative estimates, there are 5,000,000 colonies of bees in the United States, which annually yield 120,000,000 pounds of honey.

Monsignor Chigi's death reduces to three the number of Roman cardinals of princely houses. They are Cardinals Bonaparte, de Hohenlohe and Schwarzenberg.

The new English Postmaster General having gone down to his office and let himself in with a latchkey, was promptly arrested by a detective and held until identified as a non-dynamiter.

Blaine's parson friend, Rev. Burchard, has been retired by his congregation to the shades of private life, as a sort of political parson emeritus. He gets the magnificent sum of \$500 a year. Rum, Romanism, Rebellion, Rejection and Retirement.

Russia has 15,211 doctors, and maintains universities at Kazan, Kiel, Charkow, Moscow, Warsaw, Helsingfors and Dorpat. The professional men flock to the cities. In the country thousands of people die for want of medical and surgical attendance.

The homeopaths of Newburyport, Mass., are rejoicing in a victory they have gained over the "old school" in that place, where the Mayor has appointed and the Aldermen confirmed Dr. I. B. Bolton, a graduate of the Hahnemann College of Boston, as City Physician. He is the first homeopathist ever appointed to that office.

An accident which many persons are doubtless constantly expecting occurred lately in Boston. During an alarm of fire a hook and ladder truck ran into a horse car and tore off one whole side as neatly as if it had been chopped off by an axe. Three persons were severely injured. It is surprising that there are not more such accidents.

A Paris company is making white bricks of a very handsome appearance, from the pure silica used in the manufacture of plate glass. They are lighter in weight than clay bricks, but are not porous, being subjected to hydraulic pressure before the final baking process to which they are subjected. Changes of climate have no effect upon them.

In the Savile correspondence Henry Savile writes, in 1863, from Paris: "A substantial banker is to be banged here to-day for making bankrupt. I know not whether that be the best way of preventing others from the like practice." Opinions as to this from Messrs Ward, Eno and others will be in order.

Sharply con rasted, says the Washington Star, against the public festivities of the past week have been the personal griefs of some of the prominent public men. Mr. Blaine was absent from the city on inauguration day, standing at the grave of his sister, Secretary Vilas has received news that a sister is at the point of death, and Marshal Slocum hurried home to the sick bed of a brother.

The law against pool selling has at last been enforced in New York. Judge Moore of the King County Court of General Sessions, on Friday last sentenced Paul Bauer, proprietor of the West Brighton Hotel and the adjoining club-house, and Tom Glass, proprietor of a Brooklyn saloon, to three months in the State penitentiary and a fine of \$750 for allowing pools to be sold in their houses.

The Lancet says that appetite is a most misleading sensation, only remotely related to the actual demands of the organism. If we only ate more deliberately we should find half our accustomed quantity of food sufficient to satisfy the most eager cravings of hunger, and hence save ourselves from the evils of dyspepsia, or, on the other hand, a tendency to over increase in weight.

Annual Encampments.

The Legislature has passed a bill appropriating the sum of \$3,000 annually for an encampment of the State Guard, and it has already been decided to hold the first encampment at Asheville, at Warm Springs, sometime during the month of next July. The encampment will cover a period of about ten days, during which the soldiers will have nothing to do but drill, cook rations, loaf about and have a good time generally. They will be provided with tents and blankets and during the term of encampment will live under regular military rules.

Opera House.

Harry Miner's "Silver King" Co., will appear at the Opera House in this city next Saturday night and in Matinee in the afternoon. The company is a strong one, and the play has a world-wide reputation. In speaking of the play, the New York Herald says: "When the powerful melodrama, 'The Silver King,' was produced at Wallack's Theatre last winter, it scored an instant success, and for over 100 nights the theatre was crowded with auditors, anxious to see the strongest play on the stage. The piece has more material, with literary and dramatic merit, than any play for the last century. Its success was 80 great at the Grand Opera House, New York, the past two weeks, that Manager Henry E. Abbey offered \$20,000 cash for the play, and it was refused; and he then secured the present company for two weeks return later in the season."

Personal.

Lieut.-Governor Stedman returned to the city last night from Raleigh, the Legislature having adjourned yesterday.

Hon. A. H. Van Bokkelen has returned from Washington, where he has been to witness the inauguration ceremonies.

Mr. H. C. McQueen has returned to the city after an absence of several days. He was in Washington on the day of the inauguration and went as far North as New York during his trip. That clever gentleman, E. T. Boykin, Esq., of Clinton, Speaker pro tem of the Senate, has been commissioned by Gov. Seales as Judge-Advocate-General of the State Guard, with the rank of Colonel.

Mr. Geo. M. Ellis, brother to our townsman, Dr. S. C. Ellis, is in the city where we hope he has come to stay. Mr. Ellis is a young man, a native of Nova Scotia, but for a year past he has resided in Boston. He will study medicine here with his brother, the Doctor. We welcome him to Wilmington.

Insane Freaks.

On Saturday night last, Hamlet Holmes, colored, who lives about 7 miles below the city at Town Creek, while laboring under an insane frenzy, set fire to his own house and would have perished in the flames had it not been for the timely interference of a young colored man, who pulled him out of the burning building. Holmes was badly burned about the head, but his fury had not abated, for he went to the house of one of his brothers and set it on fire and then set fire to the house and barn of another brother. At the latter place he caught all the geese he could find and threw them into the flames. He next went to the house of another colored man and tried to gain admittance, but the door was barred against him, when he took an axe and burst it open, in doing which he split the hand of the owner of the house nearly its entire length. He was finally captured, secured and taken to Smithville and lodged in jail, where he now remains. Holmes has a wife and family and has heretofore been a quiet, peaceable man. The first evidence of his insanity was discovered only a few days ago. All the buildings to which he set fire were totally consumed.

Fire In The Woods.
All day yesterday there was a dense smoke to the eastward of the city, and a good many cinders moved by the easterly winds were lodged in our streets and yards, showing that fires were raging in the woods, not far from here. We learn to-day that the woods north of the turnpike have been burned from a point near the Mineral Spring clear to the Sound. The fire extended in a northerly direction towards the Wilmington & Weldon Railroad, and as night approached the eastern horizon became lighted by the blaze, so that many thought that there was indeed a fire in the northeastern suburbs of the city. This gave rise to a false alarm when the bell of St. Mark's Church struck for the regular night service, and for a few moments there was all the uproar and confusion incident to a regular alarm of fire in the night time.
