The Salvation Army in parts of England has taken to faith curing, and "extraordinary cases" are being reported. The Liverpool Post reports, for example, that at Hanley "a lad, crippled from a very early age - was first operated upon, and while Major Pearson vigorously rubbed the disabled limb, his followers prayed for healing powers. They prayed earnestly and long, and finally the lad was induced to rise, and, amidst great excitement, managed to walk a little. After prayers for another three-quarters of an hour, a deaf woman, aged 70 years, a young woman who was stone deaf, and another young woman, a confirmed invalid, stated that hearing and health had been restored. Other equally marvellous cures are reported. In one case a young woman went to the building with a crutch and returned without its aid; and another woman ascended the platform and publicly certified to her miraculous recovery. The whole congregation joined in thanksgiving at these marvellous cures."

Citizen Gorsuch, an Anarchist from Chicago has been lecturing in Philadelphia after the manner of his crazy kind. He proposes to destroy crime by abolishing property, which is as if one should undertake to get rid of murder by giving everybody the right to cut anybody's throat. He does not approve of the advice, "Go West, and win wealth!" but says boldly: "You are surrounded by untold wealth; stay here and take it, and remember that any means is justifiable." Theoretically this substitution of the bold and direct methods of larceny and highway robbery for the tedious and roundabout processes of accumulation by industry and economy is attractive, but in practice it might not work satisfactorily. We are mistaken if Citizen Schwab does not at once fall upon him with a bung-starter; and convince him that there are private rights in property.

Herat, the present bone of contention between England and Russia, is comparatively small for a place of such paramount importance, containing barely 50,000 inhabitants. It is situated in a slight depression on the summit of a rocky ridge 2,650 feet high, forming one of the westernmost spurs of the great Safed Koh (White Mountains) range, which runs across Northern Afghanistan from West to East. It is surrounded by a wall which, measured from the base of the earthen mound on which it stands, attains a height of seventy-five feet, which is considerably exceeded by several of the one hundred and fifty towers that strengthen it. But these defences, though seemingly formidable, are now, like those of most Afghan fortresses, fast crumbling to decay from long neglect. The citadel, like that of Cairo, stands on a steep rock in the centre of the town. There are four bazaars, which lie just within the four principal gates. The place has a considerable trade with Persia, India, Turkestan and Western China, the chief local products being saffron, assafetida, saddery, caps, cloaks, shoes, carpets, saddles and dressed sheepskins. The name of the town is said to be derived from the Heri-"Rud" or river, which flows along the Southern base of the ridge upon which Herat stands.
