The only change is in the section in reference to spirituons, vinous or malt liquors, or medicated bitters, which is now as follows: 1st. selling in quantities of one quart and borders. less than five gallons, \$6 25. 3rd. For selling in quantities of five gallons or more, \$25. 4th. For selling malt liq-
