THE WAR SCARE.

Exciting Rumors Produce Renewed Fears of Conflict.

LONDON, March 25, 1885.—The tension between Russia and England over the Afghan frontier question has increased. The stock market is excited.

The Paris Temps says that it considers war between Russia and England to be imminent. Excitement was caused in London to-day by the report from Constantinople to the effect that the Porte has asked the advice of Prince Bismarck in regard to a Russo-Russian alliance against England.

News from the Continent shows that all the continental bourses sympathized with the financial situation in London, and that prices toward the close were flat.
