Exciting Rumors Produce Renewed Fears of Conflict.

The Paris Temps says that it considers-war between Russia and England to be imminent. Excitement was from Constantinople to the effect that the Porte has asked the advice of Prince Bismarck in regard to a Turco Russian alliance against England. Still further excitement was caused by the publication of a report that 25 000 militia had been called out and that Russia had rejected the last English proposals. The Standard, however, says that no despatch of an alarming nature has been received from the Russian government. On the other hand, all the offi cers belonging to the British Indian army and now in Europe on furlough-have been ordered to immediately rejoin their respective regiments.

An additional force of 20,000 Russian troops is proceeding from Caucisus to the Afghanistan frontier.

Earl Dufferin, the Viceroy, met General Sir Donald Stewart, the commander-in-chief of the forces in India, at Allahabad yesterday. The Vicercy sanctioned the mobilization of two army corps of 25,000 men each, which have the supreme command, while General Sir Frederick Roberts will April 23-Wednesday, S. Pau'ls, Edenton.

LONDON, March 25, 1885 - Despatch es from Suakim state that the British camps were not disturbed by the enemy last night. Skirmishers have been sent out on the way to Tamai. The general advance, which was to have been made on Sunday last, will, it is now thought, has telegraphed the government that the guards and marines showed great steadiness under fire during the harassing engagement of yesterday. The cavalry also, General Graham says, behaved well. They dismounted and checked the enemy's advance by fre quent volleys. The British losses on Sunday are much greater than at first reported. General Graham telegraphs the home government that he fears he must add to the list of that day's killed thirty-eight men who are still missing from the Sikhs (Indian) regiment. It now appears that the transport and commissariat branches of the service alone lost 150 men killed in last Sunday's engagement near Tamai. 
