The French in Tonquis,

PARIS, March 31.-The Chamber of Deputies this afternoon, unanimously voted the first instal quent, amounting to \$10.000.000, of the Lonquin eredit of \$40,000,000 asked for by M. Ferry vesterday bafore the resignation of his Cabient. The Deputies voted to reserve action on the remaining \$30,000,coo until the formation of the new Ministry.

The Government has received a despatch from Gen. de L'Isle, the commander of the French forces in Tonguin, in which he entreats the War Office to send him reenforcements immediately. Eight thousand men have been ordered to proceed immediately to Tooquin to reenforce the French army. Much alarm is felt over the fact that no news has been received for upward of thirtysix hours from the French army in Tonquin.

The losses sustained by Gen. Negrier's forces are now estimated at 1 -500 men. Gen. Negrier was wounded in the breast by a bullet, and one of his aides-de-ramp, Col. Berge, received a bullet wound in the head.

It is rumored that the Annamese have risen against French, authority. The rising is attributed to, the French reverses in Tonquin and to the intrigues of the Chinese Mandarins.






