Minister Phelps' Twelve Maxims.

MIDDLEBURY, Vt., March 31.—When the Hon. John W. Stewart of Middlebury first took his seat in the lower House of Congress as the representative of the First Vermont district, in December, 1883, he received a letter of satirical good advice from a distinguished Vermont Democrat, who had long been a personal and professional friend.
