A payal officer at Washington says he knows that the Russian Government has offered John Roach \$100,000 more for the Dolphin than the price named in Roach's contract with the United States. Roach, he says, has asked the navy department to say at once whether it des'res the Dolphin or not, offering, if the department will say that it does not, to return the money already paid him on that account with interest. The same naval officer is authority for the statement that the Russians have offered to buy from Roach the unfinished cruisers Chicago, Atlanta and Boston, just as they stand on the docks, at prices higher than those promised by the United States, and that Roach is anxious to complete the bargain with the Russians.

It is said in the treasury department at Washington that the advent of the new Administration has had a wholesome influence there. The entire force is more exact in coming at 9 and not leaving until 4 in the atternoon. It is also said that there is more apparent industry in the department, less gossipping and less promenading in the halls. There is also a marked improvement in the temper of the clerks, and not so many complaints and bickerings. An anxiety is expressed to be kept constantly employed, lest it might be discovered that there was a useless number of clerks in some part of the buildings. Gen. Komaroff's "explanation" and Russia's attitude toward it aptly Elustrates the French duellist's celebrated maxim, "Put the other party in the wrong and then thrust straight." Neither the general's own exploit nor the action taken by his Government respecting it are anything novel Russia's policy. When Admiral Na chimoff destroyed the whole Turkish fleet at one blow off Sinope in 1853, Russia of course "regretted the unfortunate occurrence." and made a show of blaming its author. But the offending admiral was privately invested with the Order of the White Eagle, and the advantage that he had gained was utilized to the utmost. So, too, when Gen. Tchernaleff, in June, 1865 captured Tashkend (the present capital of Russian Turkestan) by a sudden dash like that of Komaroff, similar protestations and assurances of precisely equal value were made by the Cabinet of St. Peterburg.
