Postal Changes.

Postmaster General William F. Vilas has issued an order to the effect that on and after the 1st of July, 1885, all domestic first class matter sent through the mails, including drop letters at letter carrier offices, must be charged with postage at the rate of two cents per ounce or fraction thereof, instead of two cents per half ounce or fraction thereof. Drop letters at other than letter-carrier offices to be charged at the rate of one cent per ounce or fraction thereof. Due postage, at the rate of two cents per half ounce or fraction thereof, shall be charged on partially prepaid first-class matter mailed on or before June 30, and not reaching its destination until on or after July 1st. Another change reduces the rate postage on second class matter from two cents per pound, as at present authorized, to one cent per pound, on and after the 1st of July, 1885. To provide for wants that may arise from this change in the rate of second class postage, the Department has decided to issue a newspaper and periodical postage stamp of the denomination of one cent, the design and color of which will be the same as those of the present series of newspaper and periodical stamps of the denominations of from two to ten cents. Stamps of this denomination will be ready for issue by the 1st of June, after which all postmasters needing them will make requisition for suitable supplies.

The Shoplifters.

After our report of yesterday was closed regarding the capture of stolen property and the arrest of a part of the gang of thieves, Officers Strode and Brewington continued the search for plunder with quite successful results. The first search was in the house occupied by Mary McNeill, colored, on the North side of the railroad, where they found a large lot of stolen property, among which were pieces of broad silk and satin—identified as the property of Capt. R. M. McIntire—besides two coats, a pair of trousers, a pair of shoes, a piece of mosquito netting, a lot of calicos, &c., which have not yet been identified. This property was taken possession of by the officers and brought to the sheriff's office where it was placed under lock and key. The woman, McNeill, was also arrested and brought along with the goods, and subsequently she, with Mag and Sophy Fisher, was taken to jail.

Sudden Death.

Yesterday's *Greensboro Argus* says: "On the arrival of the Wilmington train at this place yesterday, a negro was seen to get off and go over to Granger's office, near the Opera House. He hailed a gentleman passing and asked him to please get him a doctor, as he was very sick. Dr. Cobb responded and found him suffering with some pain in the heart, and went to Miller & Shannon's drug store to procure medicine. When he returned he found the negro had fallen over dead. The coroner was summoned, but did not think a jury necessary, deciding, on investigation, that he died of heart disease, probably *angina pectoris*. The deceased proved to be Ennis Nelson, formerly of this place, but of late living in Wilmington. On his person was found a certificate stating that he was a Free Will Baptist preacher in the New Hanover district, in good standing. He has a wife living in this place, though he had abandoned her."
