The Approaching Festival.
 The committee having in charge the preparations for the approaching festival for the benefit of the Wilmington Light Infantry, are working earnestly and with well directed efforts to make the occasion a complete success. Since our last report the names of Mrs. John L. Cantwell and Mrs. Albert Gore have been added to the committee. The ladies constituting the committee met at the City Hall this morning for the purpose of perfecting arrangements for the festival and a large number of other ladies were present who signified their willingness and desire to render such assistance as they could. The meeting was quite enthusiastic and all the ladies present entered into the spirit of the work with a commendable zeal, which was of itself a guarantee of success. Much interest was manifested by all present and we bespeak for the committee and ladies engaged in this truly laudable enterprise the hearty co-operation and assistance of the male portion of our citizens. The company is an honor to Wilmington and no word or act of encouragement should be left unsaid or undone for its prosperity and advantage. We hear that, during the festival, a paper to be called by the appropriate name of *The Bugler*, will be issued. This paper will be edited by members of the company and its literary department will be devoted exclusively to military matters. There will be an opportunity offered for our business men to advertise in its columns.

Wilmington Library.
 The annual meeting of the Wilmington Library Association will be held at their Library rooms on Market street to-night and it is very essential that there should be a full attendance as business of importance will be transacted. We are glad to learn that the Library is in a prosperous condition and that its sphere of usefulness is being constantly enlarged and its manifold benefits to our citizens are becoming more fully appreciated. The following is a synopsis of the annual report which will be submitted by the Board of Directors at the meeting to-night, and it speaks well for the success of the Library Association:

"The condition of the Association is not less favorable than at the termination of the last fiscal year. Reviewing the work which has been accomplished within the two years past and remarking the slowly increasing interest by the public in the Library, there is reason to believe that, with discreet and energetic management, the Library will become largely and generally patronized, which would enhance its income and enable it to supply the present great want of books.

"Within the year, one hundred and ninety-eight volumes have been added to the Library by purchase, while some fifty volumes of more or less value, have been donated by Rev. Dr. Wilson and Col. S. L. Fremont. The heirs of the late Henry Nutt have presented to the Library, upon the condition of their return should the Association dissolve at any time, the highly valuable collection of forty-four bound volumes of newspapers, published in Wilmington, between the years 1833 and 1873. There have been nineteen hundred and forty-two volumes taken from the Library during the year, and the call for books is increasing all the time.

"We have now one hundred and five members. Within the year, there have been thirty admissions, twenty-nine resignations, and nineteen members expelled for non-payment of dues. To sustain the Library and meet its expenses, with recourse to entertainments or lectures, our membership should number at least one hundred and fifty. The treasury will show.

"Of this balance, \$129.58 is to be credited of the book fund, it having been agreed with the gentlemen who purchased life memberships, that the amount realized should be applied to the purchase of books. The indebtedness of the Library does not exceed seventy-five dollars while it has due it by members one hundred and thirty-two dollars which is collectable."

THE ATTENTION OF ALL CITIZENS IS called to special instructions given to the policemen, and the same will be enforced from and after the 20th day of May, 1885:

1st. That chicken coops and boxes and barrels, whether empty or not, and all merchant dice and stock in trade, must be removed from the sidewalks of the city. This does not apply to the necessary temporary use of the sidewalks for the purpose of receiving and forwarding of goods.

2nd. To prevent the sale, or the offering for sale, on the sidewalks, or peddling in the streets, any article required by the market ordinance of 7th April, 1883, to be sold at the city market houses, such as fish, fresh meat, oysters, poultry, vegetables, &c.

3rd. To investigate and report all violations of the law in regard to the sale of liquor on Sunday.

4th. To suppress all fast driving by pleasure or other vehicles, and to require all draymen to be with their horses when moving.

5th. To prevent all persons from hitching any horse or mule to any shade tree.

6th. To report at once all violations of the Sanitary laws of the city, in connection with garbage, snags, privies, &c.
