

Since Secretary Whitney discharged employees from the Mare Island navy yard for political offences further developments concerning other matters connected with the establishment there are said to have been brought to light. It is intimated that some interesting in-

tormation will soon be made public in regard to the cost of repairing the Mohican, a vessel which has cost the Government \$900,000 since she was first commissioned. Three vessels equal to the Mohican is every respect could have been built for a like sum.

The report of a Legislative investigat ng committee in Massachusetts will show that the cost to the Bell Company of the ordinary rubber hand telephone is \$1.62, and of the transmitter \$1.80; total, \$3.42. The average rental charged by the Bell Company of the subcompanies is \$7 per year each for the hand telephones and the transmitters, or more than four times the original cost. The net earnings of the Bell Telephone Company for the year ending March 1, 1885, were \$1,710,892.69.
