**Torn into Ribbons.**  
 When Mr. J. J. Rowland was killed on Tuesday he had some \$400 or \$500 in his pocket. These were in bank notes and they were torn into ribbons. They will probably be sent to the Treasury Department at Washington, D. C., for redemption.

It may be necessary to note that in our remarks yesterday relative to the conduct of business at the Custom House we referred simply to Capt. Pennypacker in his relations with the business community of Wilmington. The management of the office and any political use which the Collector may have made of the positions at his disposal were not intended to be included in the scope of our remarks.

**The John Dawson**  
 Capt R. P. Paddison informs us that the hull of the burned steamer *John Dawson* has been raised and found to be broken in twain. Her boiler is also badly damaged, the upper plates which were exposed to the flames having expanded so much from the heat to which they were subjected as to start bolts. He thinks it will take about three months before she will be again ready for service as she will have to be nearly all rebuilt. In the meantime the beautiful and unique looking steam flat *D. J. Black* will do duty upon the waters of Black river, and will run at the rate of a "pretty good jog" an hour.

**Pender Co. Board of Health.**  
 The Board met at Burgaw Monday June 1st, 1885. There was a fine attendance of the members. The Board has entered vigorously upon the duty of improving the sanitary condition of the county and is emphatically alive body. The subject of drinking water was discussed for several hours, preceded by a well written essay on drinking water by Dr. R. F. Saunders. The Board recommend suitable cisterns as substitutes for wells. Dr. George F. Lucas was continued as essayist to prepare an essay for the next meeting on cholera. Dr. E. Porter was appointed to report at the next meeting on tobacco as a remedy in disease, and its effects upon the system when used in health. Dr. S. S. Satchwell, recently elected County Superintendent of Health, tendered his resignation. Accepted, and Dr. R. T. Saunders elected in his place. The Board resolved to be prepared to meet an invasion of cholera or any other epidemic. The Secretary, Dr. K. J. Powers, was instructed to send a brief synopsis of the proceedings of this meeting to the *Wilmington Review* and *Star* and *Goldsboro Messenger*, for publication. Adjourned to meet at Burgaw on the first Monday in September next.

**Sad Intelligence.**  
 A dispatch was received here this morning from Greensboro, N. C. by Mr. Robert Lee, bringing the sad news that his son, Mr. R. E. Lee, had died in that city at 2 o'clock this morning. The young man had been at school at Greensboro and was to have graduated and taken his diploma yesterday, and was expected home by his parents to-day; but he was taken with a chill on Friday last which culminated in pneumonia and resulted in death. His mother was prepared to go to her son when the shocking news came. A letter was received from Greensboro on Tuesday which stated that Edgar, as the young man was familiarly called, was much better and was considered out of danger, which buoyed up the hopes of the anxious parents only to have them cruelly crushed by the later news. The deceased was about 17 years of age, was a very worthy and estimable young man, and was highly esteemed by all who knew him. He was formerly in the employ of Mr. George A. Peck and more recently by Mr. F. A. Newbury, as a salesman, leaving the latter situation to finish his studies at Greensboro. Our sincere sympathies are extended to the afflicted family in their sad bereavement. The remains will be brought to Wilmington for interment.

**Amusements.**  
 Mr. C. J. Warner, agent of the Standard Dramatic Company, will arrive in the city to-night. The Company will arrive here in time to appear at the Opera House on Monday night. The engagement will continue all of next week and the company will be provided with a brass band and orchestra.

**The Midland R. R.**  
 The Wilmington & Weldon R. R. have purchased what is known as the Midland North Carolina Railway. This road is 22 miles long and runs from Goldsboro to Smithfield, in Johnston county, and was built by Mr. W. J. Best, during the days of his railroad pilgrimage in North Carolina. The *Goldsboro Argus* says that the price paid was \$60,000, which is at the rate of \$2,727 per mile. Hon. R. R. Bridgers, President of the W. & W. R. R., says that the road will be thoroughly overhauled and repaired and that as soon as possible the transfer is to be made at once and the road bed, which is now 5 feet, will be changed and reduced to the standard measurement. This will be done in a few days and Capt. Divine went over the road to-day to look into its actual condition.

**Death of Mr. Parsley.**  
 Mr. Oscar G. Parsley, one of the most venerable and most highly esteemed citizens of Wilmington, died at his residence, at Hilton, last night, in the 80th year of his age. Mr. Parsley's health has been very feeble for a number of years past, but the end was rather sudden, as he was able to appear on the streets in his buggy only a few days ago.

Mr. Parsley was born on the 25th day of February, 1806. In the year 1830, when quite a young man, he came to this city to carve out the handsome fortune achieved by him in later years. He was first clerk for Messrs. Dudley & Dickinson, proprietors of the Clinton Steam Saw Mills and commission merchants, who then occupied an office in a building situated on the site of that now occupied by Mr. Sol. Bear, on Market street. Two years afterwards he married a daughter of Mr. Murdoch McKay, a resident of Wilmington at that time. Not long after this Mr. Parsley himself became a mill owner and has ever since that time remained in the business. A few years previous to the war he erected the steam saw mills at Hilton which are now run by the firm of Parsley & Wiggins. For many years previous to the war he was thoroughly identified with the business interests of the town of Wilmington and his name became indissolubly associated with its prosperity. He was at one time Mayor of the town and was for several terms a member of the Board of Commissioners. When the Commercial Bank of Wilmington was established, some years prior to the war, he was made President of that institution and continued as such up to its close, soon after the outbreak of hostilities. He leaves three sons and three daughters to mourn their irreparable loss, his second son, the gallant Col. Wm. M. Parsley, of the Third N. C. Infantry, having been killed at the head of his command a few days before the surrender at Appomattox.

Mr. Parsley was for long one of the trustees of the First Presbyterian church and the funeral services will take place from that church to-morrow morning.
