BASE BALL AND MUSIC.

Durham vs. Seaside—Benefit for Cornet Concert Club—A Close Game and Excellent Music Expected.

On Thursday, the 11th inst., the Durham and Seaside Base Ball Clubs will play a match game at the grounds of the latter in this city, which will be the first game played here by the former nine. The Seaside has tendered a benefit to the Cornet Concert Club on that occasion, to assist the latter in paying for the new uniforms which they have recently ordered. The Cornet Concert Club will play at the Seaside grounds, commencing at 3 o'clock p. m. on that day, and it is hoped that our people will turn out in good numbers and give them a rousing benefit. During the Concert, Prof. J. C. Herndon, one of the best cornet soloists in the State, will play several solos. Besides these a programme of unusual excellence has been selected and will be played by the band. This, together with the fact that the Durham nine is considered a crack club, will be an inducement such as should throng the grounds with visitors.

Base Ball.

The match game of base ball between the Seaside, of the city, and the Nationals, of Goldsboro, which was played on Saturday afternoon at the grounds of the former club, resulted in a victory for the latter nine, if we may call that a victory in which the winners had four professions while the vanquished played with an entire home team. Koochogay and Kurtz, the professionals of the Seaside, were both unable to play; the former on account of a lame finger and the latter in consequence of a sprained ankle, while the Nationals had Latouche, Frank, Williams and Chapman as professionals. Besides these they also had one player who was not an actual resident of Goldsboro, which was a violation of the League rules. It seems that the game was played, so far as the Nationals were concerned, in direct violation of three of the provisions of the State League, as follows: They have played with four professionals, when entitled to only two; they have played with men not actual residents of the place, and they have hired men who were in the employ of other nines in the State. Of course the game Saturday, as well as that of Friday, was played by the Seaside under protest, and their defeat in the last game will not count against them in the count for the championship.

There was some good playing on both sides, but the Seaside made a number of almost inexcusable errors, which were more the cause of defeat than through any remarkably good playing of their opponents. The playing was rather loose on both sides.

We do not believe in hiring professionals at all, and hope that in the next season's games the different clubs composing the State League will play with their own talent. In connection with this matter and as embodying our ideas of the question we give the following, which we clip from the Goldsboro Argus:

"It seems to us that the 'professional battery' business is an innovation, anyway, upon the true spirit of base ball in our State; for it is tantamount to the clubs of the various cities and towns of our State saying to one another, 'We can hire a professional 'battery' that you can hire.' We would gladly welcome a return to the old way of playing ball; when Goldsboro and afterwards Newbern had the leading of the State. In those days we hired no professional 'batteries' and we had a heap more real fun and glory, too—real State glory."

Another extract, taken from the same paper, says:

The games between the Nationals—so-called—and the Seaside at Wilmington on Friday and yesterday are not looked upon in this city as State League games; nor do our citizens consider that the Nationals proper played the Seaside, nor do the Nationals, not one of them, approve of the games as played; hence they have concluded to publicly exonerate themselves and redeem the honor of their club at once by taking such steps as they may consider necessary at their next meeting. The club that played Wilmington under the name of National was made up of six strangers and only three of our boys, and those three played merely to protect the finances of the club.
