Oxford University, on the 9th inst. conferred the honorary degree of doctor of divinity upon the Bishop of Win- chester, Bath and Bristol, the Chair- man of the committees on the revised Bible, and the Rev. Phillips Brooks, of Boston.

Naples at last has its Croton. A whole river in the Apennines has been diverted to the city and is now flowing through 10,000 pipes and playing in the five ornamental fountains constructed for it. The King and Queen came to inaugurate the waterworks, and were received with indescribable enthusiasm.

Lord Warwick is one of those Eng- lish landlords who are suffering par- ticularly from the land depression. He has for some years been living in the quietest way. But his son's marriage with a great heiress will enable War- wick Castle to be well maintained in the future. Lord Leigh, whose heir was killed last year in the Rocky Mountains, is said to get about half the income he got some years ago from his great estate in Warwickshire.

A colored clergyman who had been put on trial before a jury in Darien, Ga., for some offense, was brought in not guilty, the other day. The defend- ant said: "Read that again." The colored women, who crowded the court room, set up a hallelujah chorus, in which the preacher joined; and the Judge had to sit still and let them have it out.

Lord Randolph Churchill, the Tory Terrier, as he is now called, need not fear that the G. O. M. will turn round and rend him.

The London *Times* recently spoke of the black houses of the natives on the Scotch Islands of Syke and the Western Islands as confined, dark, and un- healthy. A Highlander in answer writes to that journal that he passed his early years in one of these primitive dwellings or huts, and that their veni- lation, although draughty, is good, and the inhalation of the peat smoke, with which the atmosphere is charged, pro- tects the lungs from consumption and other parasitic germ diseases. In proof he cites the statement of Dr. Morgan of Manchester that these Highlanders enjoy a singular immunity from phthisis, which is to be ascribed, chiefly to the inhalation of the peat smoke, and the antiseptic ingredients contained therein—the tar, the croesote, and the tannin, together with various volatile oils and resins, black unctuous peat being rich in these substances. Dr. Morgan further remarks that any ex- ception from attacks of consumption which these Highlanders enjoy is only so long as they reside in their smoky huts.

The law, cheapening postage by in- creasing the weight of letters to one ounce for the single rate, to go into effect July 1, is already giving token of its influence in the orders that manufactur- ers are getting. Light weight writing papers had the preference over the heavy ones to avoid double postage, but now the tendency is setting toward the heavy rapers, which, of course, are greatly to be preferred.

When Mr. Fawcett, the late Post- master-General of England, returned to health after lying for a time at death's door, he stated that his illness had at least freed him from the fear of death. In the most serious part of his trouble he felt no anxiety, and did not fear, as he had in health, that the end would be preceded by great pain or a severe struggle. He felt that his heart would slowly and, without his knowl- edge, cease to beat.

This is the readiness of rich citizens to perform public service at their private expense. The University of Athens boasts an endowment at this moment of more than \$12,000,000.
