Educational.
At the recent meeting of the Board of Trustees of Wake Forest College, it was voted unanimously to receive as students all sons of ministers, of whatever denomination, free of charge.
The Endowment Fund of the College, amounting to \$102,000, is all invested in first mortgage bonds on real estate, and no money is loaned for more than one half of the taxable value of the property given in mortgage. Nearly all of the money thus invested draws interest at the rate of 8 per cent. per annum.

For Lake Waccamaw.
