**Too Wet.**  
Some of the farmers in this immediate vicinity claim that there has been too much rain lately for the growing crops. They say that, in consequence of the cold and backward Spring, when warm weather did come the corn grew with amazing rapidity and that the heavy rains have caused it to tassel so early that the corn will be very small. We hope, however, that these fears may prove unfounded and that the farmers may reap a rich return in the harvest for their toil and care in preparing and attending to the crops.

**Sailor Drowned.**  
A sailor by the name of Ole Sorensen, belonging to the Norwegian barque *Insula Capri*, Captain Danielsen, now lying at Sprunt's wharf, was drowned this morning under the following circumstances:—He had been at work in one of the vessel's boats, and had started to get upon the wharf to go on board the barque for his breakfast, when a plank gave way from under him and he was precipitated into the water. He sunk immediately and did not rise again until his body was recovered about half an hour afterwards, when life was found to be extinct. He was about 25 years of age, was unmarried and had the credit of being an excellent sailor.

**Base Ball Notes.**  
OXFORD, N. C., June 23, 1885.  
EDITOR REVIEW:—As the Oxford Base Ball Club will play in Wilmington on the 26th and 27th insts., I desire to bring to your notice an article in the *News and Observer*, of Raleigh, of the 20th inst., relative to the game played on the 19th between Raleigh and Oxford.

The article is headed "Baseball.—The Oxford Club Defeats that of Raleigh." This was the first day's playing. The *News and Observer* surely must have had his eyes shut, or he could not have failed to see, that by the score of that game, it proved to have been one of the very best that has been played during this base ball season. A score of 7 to 6 with 4 earned runs on each side, with only 6 errors for Raleigh, and 5 for Oxford, and only one passed ball to each side, is very conclusive evidence of a hotly contested game. No one can deny the fact that Oxford has beaten Raleigh on her own field, yet the *News and Observer* is unwilling to accord the victory where it belongs. The charge against Ryan is unjust in the extreme, in saying, he "is charged in the third inning with contributing to the defeat." There is no foundation whatever for such an assertion, and the *News and Observer* cannot substantiate this from the score. Let the *News and Observer* be magnanimous, and not detract from Oxford simply because they were playing against Raleigh. Other people know something about baseball playing, and from their own record of the game, Oxford beat Raleigh a fair and hotly contested game, and why not in all fairness and frankness say so? However much the *News and Observer* may dislike to have it said that the Raleigh club was fairly beaten, it is true, nevertheless.

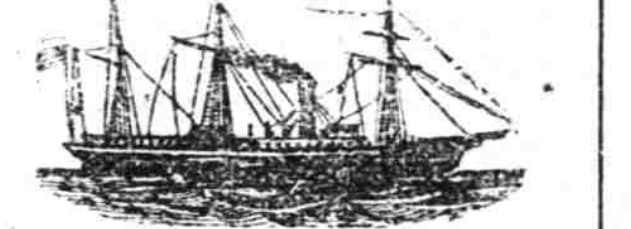
