STATE NEWS

Wadesboro Times: Dr Ingram lost his valuable ho se one day last week by sunstroke. He had gone in the country to attend a call, and it being in the heat of the day, while driving up a hill, the horse suddenly fell and died. It is unusual for a horse to be attacked by sunstroke, at least we cannot recall such an incident.

Raleigh Visitor: On Tuesday even ing las', while one of the little daughters of Mrs. Dr E A. Crudap. of Dann's township, Franklin county, was play ing near the well in the yard, the sweep to the well fell and struck the little girl on the head, rendering her unconscious, in which condition she has remained ever since not withstanding the efforts of the best medical skill. Hopes for her recovery are very slight.

Wilson Advance: Rev. Mr. Hutson left Monday and Dr. Hutham, who had returned, continued the meeting with great success. It was, however, brought to a close Tuesday night though the interest had in no wise abated. The re sult has been most satisfactory to all christian people. Fitty-four professions of religion have been made with 35 additions to the church and 30 baptisms.

Goldsboro Messenger: There was a gentleman in this city last Friday, from Pennsylvania, on a prospecting tour, who knows all about compresses, and he stated that he had visited no place on his trip where a compress could be made to pay better than here. He had an interview with several of our leading bus ness men, to whom he stated that the latest improved compress could be constructed here for \$24,000, and that he would take a one-third interest (\$8,000) in it himself, if they would subscribe the balance of the above sum.

Charlotte Democrat: We regret to learn that Prof. W C. Kerr is seriously ill at Durham. His disease is consumption, and when we saw him a few months ago we feared he would not live long. Prof. Kerr was State Geologist for a number of years, and as such did a great deal to show to the public the mineral resources of North work for his native State, and deserves a lasting monument to his memory. Lincolnton Press: Mr. W. A. Met calf, a well known c tizen of this coun'y died at his residence near Crouse's Station, last Friday, aged about 40 years. A few weeks ago Dr. W. L. Crouse was consulted by Mr. Metcalf and found him suffering from dropsy in its earliest stages and so informed him. and began to treat him for it. Mr. Metcalf became very despondent and in this condition of mind and body he unfortunately came across a pamphlet issued by a patent medicine man by the name RECEIPTS FOR MONTH ENDED JUNE 30. of Green, of Atlanta. In this pamphlet Green asserted his ability to cure dropsy and proposed sending to any one suffering from the disease a lot of medicine free. If benefited by the medicine after two or three days use, the patient Cotton, 470; spirits, 884; rosin, 1,341; was to send Green \$15 for a further supply. Mr. Metcalf applied for a supply of the medicine and received six balis, each about the size of a partridge Spirits, 3,650; rosin, 15,015; tar, 2; egg and principally composed of liqurice The directions were to take one of these balls, dissolved in water, every day and two large spoonsful of salts every hour. Mr. Metcalfstopped taking the medicine of his regular physician and commenced following Green's directions. One or two days after commencing it he felt better as the salts had the effect. of course, of lessening the effusion. He with difficulty raised \$15, which he sent Green for a further supply. He contipued treating himself after Green's directions for five days, when he began to sink and sent for Dr. Crouse. who found him utterly prostrated. On account of his extreme prostration Dr. Crouse could not do anything for him, and in one hour after Mr. Metcult had taken the fifth ball and his regular hourly dose of salts he was a dead man. He was sitting on the side of his bed.

He was sitting on the side of his bed. Crouse could not do anything for him, and suddenly and without warning, fell forward upon the floor on his face, dead. The opinion of the physicians is that he died from "heart clot." That is, that the prostration caused by the extraordi nary quantity of salts which he had taken was so great that the heart could not perform its functions and the blood gathered into it and stopped it forever. The facts are, Mr. Metcalf was not in any immediate danger of death from dropsy, but was murdered by the ignorant quackery of Green, and the Press would advise his friends and relatives to prosecute and expose him, and thus save other sufferers who may be taken in and murdered by him. Green's medicines may be the proper remedies. but the directions for taking them are what killed Metcalf. 
