LOCAL NEWS.

Personal.

Demagnetism.
A short time since we spoke at considerable length of magnetism and mentioned the fact that a watch had been magnetized and rendered for all practical uses worthless by having been placed upon the joints of two steel rails at the railroad. Watches, we are told, very frequently get more or less magnetized and become unreliable as time-keepers in consequence. To demagnetize articles that have once been magnetized has been a study for a long time among scientific men and voluminous treatises have been written upon the subject. The object has been to entirely demagnetize an article which has been fully magnetized, in an efficient and inexpensive manner. This has been effectually done by Mr. George Darden, jr., of this city, although we do not know whether he originated the plan, which is extremely simple, or not. A few days since we saw him test a common nail by a cunning little instrument called a magnetometer, and there was not the least sign of magnetism in it. He then, by the aid of a common horse shoe magnet, fully magnetized the nail, and afterwards he demagnetized the nail, as was also demonstrated by the same instrument. Singularly enough the demagnetization was accomplished through the aid of the horse shoe magnet by which the nail had at first been magnetized, by simply reversing the poles.

County Commissioners.
The Board of County Commissioners met in regular monthly session yesterday afternoon; present, H. A. Bagg, Esq. Chairman, and Commissioners B. G. Worth, E. L. Pearce, Jas. A. Montgomery and Roger Moore.

The Treasurer submitted his report for the month of June, as follows:
General fund, balance on hand, \$19,984.06
Educational fund, balance on hand, 15,346.15
Of the general fund \$7,000 is in the shape of a certificate of deposit in the First National Bank of Wilmington.

The Register of Deeds submitted his report for the month of June, showing amount of fees received from marriage licenses (\$10.45), and exhibited Treasurer's receipt for the same; also for the month of May, \$13.45.

The Board of Education elect for New Hanover county presented their official bonds, which were received, ordered registered and placed on file.

James D. Hedrick was appointed for New Hanover county a student at the University of North Carolina.

The Chairman made a report of taxes received from various parties, amounting in the aggregate to \$271.62.

Several persons were granted permission to list their taxes.

The contract for furnishing medicines for county institutions was awarded to Dr. W. H. Green for 15 cents per prescription, said contract to be in force until the first meeting in January, 1886.

It was ordered that M. Dowling be allowed to peddle without the payment of the license tax, on account of physical disability.

On motion the Board adjourned, subject to the call of the Chairman.

Board of Aldermen.

The Board of Aldermen met in regular monthly session yesterday afternoon, at 4 o'clock; present, His Honor, Mayor E. D. Hall, and Aldermen Worth, Boney, Dudley, Darby, Rourke and Howe.

Petition of Dr. J. D. Bellamy, for permission to build a store on the corner of Second and Dock streets, was referred to the committee on Fire Department with power to act.

Petition of trustees of the Second Baptist Church, for a lamp in front of the church, was referred to the committee on Lights.

Petition of John Hill and others, for a lamp in Loye's alley, was referred to the same committee.

Petition of W. A. Hudson, agent, for permission to sell books by subscription; granted, and the license fixed at \$2 per month for each man employed.

Petition of Mrs. James Alderman, to refund \$25 paid for inspector's license by her husband just before his death, was granted.

The resignation of S. H. Terry, as policeman, was accepted.

Petition of the Cornet Concert Club for the use of the City Hall for drill and practice was not granted.

Resolution of Alderman Dudley, to change section six of the Market ordinance, in reference to the sale of dressed poultry, oysters or other shell fish or any vegetables, was referred to the Market committee and Finance committee, to report at the next meeting.

Mayor Hall introduced the following resolution:

Resolved That the Finance committee be instructed to fix a suitable tax for hucksters of all marketable products.

Resolution adopted.

Mr. J. H. Currie appeared before the Board and made a statement in reference to an act of the last General Assembly to allow the city of Wilmington to aid the Cape Fear & Yadkin Valley Railroad Company to extend their road to this place, which provides for the appointment of a commission of five citizens of Wilmington by the Board of Aldermen, approved by the Board of Audit and Finance, to confer with the said company in reference to the said proposition. Mr. Currie's paper further stated that he had attached the names of 229 persons who had expressed an opinion in favor of extending aid, and that they pay \$20,652.39 in taxes; 24 names of persons opposed to extending aid, who pay \$2,929.86 in taxes, and 15 names of persons refusing to express an opinion, and they pay \$1,545.36 in taxes. Total, 268 names, paying \$25,128.61. The two hundred and sixty-eight names represent the leading business of the city in all its branches, and pay the principal part of the city taxes. Mr. Currie goes on further to say:

We deem it unnecessary to urge the importance of this enterprise to the favor of your honorable Board, for to every unprejudiced mind there can be but one opinion as to the future of Wilmington if the said road is extended here. Success will crown the efforts of the new energy that will be inspired into all our business by the completion of the Cape Fear & Yadkin Valley Railroad from the northeastern border of our own State to our "City by the Sea," to say nothing of the immense products of the great Northwest, beyond our own borders, that ultimately will seek the highway of the world through our own capacious harbor.

In conclusion, Mr. Currie asked the Board to appoint the five Commissioners in accordance with the act.

Alderman Worth offered the following resolution, which was adopted:

Resolved, That the bill entitled an act to authorize the city of Wilmington to subscribe to the capital stock and purchase bonds of the Cape Fear & Yadkin Valley Railway Company, together with the written statement or petition presented to the Board this day by J. H. Currie, be referred to a committee of five to be appointed by the Mayor, who shall report to either a called or the next regular meeting of the Board, as to the advisability of the city making a subscription, and to what amount.

And be it further resolved, That if said report be favorable to subscription, that the committee recommend to this Board from ten to twenty names of suitable persons from whom the commission of five citizens, provided for in the bill, may be selected.

Petitions of B. H. J. Abrens and W. E. Worth & Co. were referred to the Market committee with power to act. These were in reference to the erection of refrigerators in the market house.

The Board then adjourned.
