Commander Gorrige, the naval officer who brought the Egyptian obelisk, now in Central Park, New York, over to this country, died on Monday afternoon of spinal disease. He was 44 years old.

A statue is to be erected in the village of Chamounix to Horace Benedict de Saussure, the Swiss geologist, who was the first person to ascend Mont Blanc. Next year will be the centenary of this feat and the Alpine Club will commemorate it.

The *Microscope* describes a pretty experiment. Upon a slip of glass put a drop of liquid auric chloride or argentic nitrate, with half a grain of metallic zinc in the auric chloride, and copper in the silver. A growth of exquisite gold and silver ferns will form beneath the eye.

An order has been issued to the conductors of the Louisville street cars, directing them to assist old women, regardless of color, on and off the cars. This has been done because several conductors declined to assist colored women, one of whom made a complaint. There is a rumor that the conductors will refuse to obey, and that a strike is possible.

The cranks who fire anonymous communications at the President and Cabinet have taken to employing the telegraph, and they mark their bulky messages "Collect." One of these unpaid screeds received by Secretary Lamar was signed "The Bride of Christ," and was made up in equal parts of religious fervor and worldly advice.

The use of natural gas has become so universal in the foundries, factories, breweries, &c., of Pittsburgh, Pa., that a saving of nearly 40,000,000 bushels of coal annually will be effected. In fact a great industrial change has been wrought, by which thousands of men engaged in coal mining will be thrown out of work and compelled to seek other employment.

The first mission of the American Board was established in Japan only sixteen years ago, and there are now in that country 120 Protestant churches with 8,000 members. These churches are mainly self-supporting, and missionary work is carried on chiefly through native preachers and teachers. The government now favors Protestant Christianity, and encourages theological training schools.

There is an ice deposit at the mouth of the Sandy River in Oregon which is twenty feet high, half a mile long, and extending back an unknown distance. It was formed by high water from the Columbia driving it into the Sandy, and having since been covered with sand to the depth of two to five feet, the sun has little effect upon the frigid mass, and it will probably remain all Summer.

The Moon This Month.
The July moon fully on the 26th at 23 minutes after 9th o'clock in the evening. The moon in her last quarter is in conjunction with Neptune on the 8th at 6 hours 59 minutes A. M., being at the time 2 degrees 33 minutes south. She is at her nearest point to Mars on the 9th at 3 hours 44 minutes P. M., being 5 degrees 1 minute south. She pays her respects to Saturn on the 10th at 5 hours 48 minutes P. M., being 1 degrees 7 minutes south. The new moon of the 12th is in conjunction with Mercury on the 13th, at 6 hours 57 minutes A. M., being 5 degrees 39 minutes south. She draws near to Venus also on the 13th at 10 hours 21 minutes A. M., being 5 degrees 22 minutes south. She is in conjunction with Jupiter on the 15th at 2 hours 7 minutes A. M., being 3 degrees 7 minutes south, and swings her ponderous sphere at the nearest point to Uranus on the 16th at 6 hours 37 minutes P. M., being 34 minutes south, the only close conjunction of the month.

City Court.

Ransom McMillan and Caroline —, both colored, were brought before the Mayor this morning charged with disorderly conduct on Saturday night last. The game to-day was called at 4 o'clock in order that it might be completed in season for the Seaside to take to-night's train on the Carolina Central Railroad, for Charlotte, where they have made arrangements to play match games with the Raleigh club to-morrow and Friday. They will also play an exhibition game with the same club at Mt. Holly, in Gaston county, on Saturday next, and will return to this city next Sunday morning.

After the game this afternoon there will be no more games played here until the 14th and 15th inst., when the Seaside will play with the Henderson club.
