On the 17th inst. at the University of California, 319 attend to practice law.

Governor Alger has vetoed the Michigan bill abolishing the contract labor system in prisons, after having recom mended it in his message. A similar bill failed to pass in Illinois.

Nel Brantme (Col. E. Z. C. Judson) has averaged \$20,000 a year for the last ten years by the sale of his stories. He is now in the Catskills. He has written nearly 100 novels.

Dr. Strazinger, doцент for Roman theology to the University of Bonn, has accepted a corresponding professorship in Bryn Mawr College, Philadelphia. He is the first German Catholic to accept a professorship in America since ever one offered.

Least ending is becoming common at West Chester, Pennsylvania. In cooling them the wings and legs are removed, and they are thrown into boiling water for a few minutes. They are then transferred to a frying-pan of hot butter, and cooked for about five minutes.

Cholera-stricken Murcia has its hero in Count de Valle, one of the wealthiest and-owners of the province. He goes restlessly about among the sick, and, according to common reports, he has already given away all his ready money and has begun to mortgage his estates and the helpless victims of the epidemic.

The New York *Sun's* Washington correspondent says: "The Republicans in the Senate will take advantage of every opportunity to strengthen their position and to embarrass the Democratic Administration. While the readers disclaim any intention to make organized opposition to the nominations of the President, they have, in fact, reserved a mode of attacking them which may lead to trouble."

The young Princess Louise of Wales, who made her debut recently, is described as gracefully shy—not pretty, but with a gentle and pleasing expression, she was dressed very plainly in pale-pink satin and tulle, looped with clusters of cherry-blossoms, and wore to jewels save a couple of diamond earrings in her hair. Her elder brothers are the prospective King of England, is very awkward and shy.

The public demand for Miss Cleve and her book, which was issued last week, is so great that the publishers announce that the sixth edition—one complete edition was sent to England—was exhausted by Friday night. Orders were issued on Wednesday for the seventh edition one week after the appearance of the book, the edition will bear its number.

M. Worth, the great and only Worth, as tired of making dresses in the very highest style of the art for people who never pay. He has therefore issued a list of three persons. They are divided in three classes: those who absolutely cannot pay, those who order dresses out of vanity when they are unable to pay for them and those who can pay but do not. The list issued contains nearly a thousand names—princesses, duchesses, countesses, prima donnas and actresses.

The Rev. Dr. Charles A. Briggs, professor of Hebrew in the Union Theological Seminary, recently declared by a letter to be the most accomplished Biblical scholar of this country, has come out strongly against the Revised version of the Old Testament. He bids that the revisers made a great mistake in accepting as the basis of their work the same Massoretic text as that which was used by the King James' version, and concludes that in a short time the Revised version will need revising.

Ysult Dudley is reported to have declared on entering Middletown Asylum that she would not be kept there any longer than is necessary to make it appear that she is temporarily insane. She feels sure of release by next spring, and says nobody has ever imagined her deranged. She would have been acquitted, she avers, had not there been a disposition in the community to pander to the worst class of Irish citizens in order to secure their votes. The great body of the American people, she says, are in sympathy with her, and approve her effort to kill Russia.

The Austrian Government has refused to authorize the establishment of private cremation societies on the ground that they might encourage crime. The decree states that murders are often detected by the exhumation of bodies, and that, even if bodies were to be examined before cremation, there would be no time to apply in every case those delicate chemical tests which are used where poisoning is suspected.

The expensive habits of the officers of the British cavalry have reached a point where none but the rich can live comfortably in a regiment, and the consequence is, the British cavalry is getting short of officers. Luxury has been disintegrating all branches of society and even limbering the claws of the British lion of late years.

British barque *Ella Moore*, Byers, cleared to-day for Harburg, Germany, with 3 573 barrels rosin, valued at \$4,109, shipped by Messrs. Paterson, Downing & Co. Schooner *Lizzie Major*, Foster, cleared for Port-au-Prince, Hayti, with 165,652 feet lumber, valued at \$2,761.24, shipped by Messrs. E. Kidder & Son, making a total of exports foreign amounting to \$6,870.24.

Service in Camp.

Rev. Dr. Carmichael, who is chaplain both of the Wilmington Light Infantry and of the Second Regiment N. C. State Guard, has made arrangements with the Cornet Concert Club for a grand rendering of the Episcopal Service in camp at Asheville on the 26th inst., which will be the 8th Sunday after Trinity. Dr. Carmichael has addressed a letter to Rt. Rev. T. B. Lyman, Episcopal Bishop of North Carolina, inviting the latter to be present and preach on that occasion. In reply Bishop Lyman has cordially accepted the invitation.

Industrial School.

An Industrial School, similar to that recently started at the corner of Fifth and Wooster streets, will be organized at Brooklyn Hall at 4 o'clock next Thursday afternoon. It will be under the auspices and direction of the ladies of the First Baptist Church and instruction will be given two afternoons in each week. The ordinary duties of a well-regulated household will be taught to the pupils, including sewing, mending, patching, darning, knitting and many other industries which every young lady ought to be familiar with. The promoters of the plan are earnest, devoted, practical and faithful Christian women and we wish them God speed in the noble work they have so cheerfully undertaken.

City Court.

Mary Huggins and Rosanna Lee, two reputable colored girls, were brought before the Mayor this morning, charged with disorderly conduct. They were adjudged guilty and Mary was required to pay a fine of \$3, while Rosanna was fined \$5.

Ed Thomas and Andrew Russ, two colored men, charged with disorderly conduct last Saturday night, were the next on the docket. It appeared from the testimony that Thomas was engaged in a scuffle with another man and when officer Thames attempted his arrest he struck at the officer and drew an axe helve upon him, upon which the latter blew his whistle, when Thomas ran and escaped. He was shortly after arrested and when being taken to the guard house, Russ followed and used some very incendiary language and also made several attempts to trip up officer Bryant, who was one of the officers in charge of Thomas. The latter was fined \$5 for his offense and Russ was fined \$10 for his share of the fun.

Bible Work.

At a meeting of the Executive Committee of the New Hanover Bible Society, held July 8th, Mr. J. M. Elder, the colporteur of the Society, was authorized and requested to solicit contributions in aid of the work in which the Society is now engaged—that of canvassing the city with a view to supplying the destitute with the Bible. Mr. Elder is now engaged in that work and we trust that all will cheerfully respond to his call for assistance to successfully pursue his labors.

The Bible may be found in nearly every household of our fair land, but it is lamentably true that there are some houses where it is not; and there are instances of the woful ignorance of all that relates to God and Christ, as revealed in His precious Word. Mr. Elder tells us of an instance, within a few miles of this city, where an aged woman had never seen a Bible and had never heard of God until she was brought afflicted to the city hospital, where some Christian hearted woman called upon and gave her the blessed Book and told her of "Our Father in Heaven."

This is eminently a Bible reading community, and we could hardly credit the statement that there was a single adult person in North Carolina so utterly ignorant of Divine things. There is need yet for Bible societies.
