Important Meeting. A meeting of the Chamber of Commerce, Board of Trade and Produce Exchange was held this noon at the Exchange. The object of the meeting was to hold an interchange of opinions with Gen. R. F. Hoke, who is here in the interest of an extension of the Carolina Central Railroad to the Cranberry Iron Mines, in the Northwestern portion of the State, where, by a short cut, it would form connection with Cincinnati and other prominent cities of the Northwest. Gen. Hoke, upon being introduced, spoke of the importance of this contemplated undertaking to the financial and commercial prosperity of Wilmington and showed that this city is nearer Cincinnati by a great many miles than any other city on the Atlantic Coast. He spoke of the importance of securing, as far as possible, the traffic of the Northwest to this city, and of the advantages which would necessarily follow from such an extension of our railroad facilities. He was listened to with marked attention and his words created considerable interest in the minds of his hearers.

The Carolina Central Railroad is now completed and running to Shelby and it is intended to push the work on as rapidly as possible to Morganton, which is only about 40 miles from the Cranberry Iron Works in Mitchell county. It is not proposed to ask any pecuniary aid from our people, but that at the proper time our city should use her influence in securing the aid of convict labor to assist in the completion of the work. Gen. Hoke had maps with him showing the route proposed, and he stood ready and willing to answer any and all questions that were propounded.

Quite a number of his former comrades in arms were present to give the General a cordial shake of the hand in memory of "auld lang syne."

A Driving Park.

In nearly every city and town of any importance in the South there is a driving park established, where ladies and gentlemen may engage in the pleasures of a ride and where it has become customary to hold races for purses once or twice in each year. These parks possess many attractions and on pleasant days it is no unusual thing to see upon them quite a number of carriages containing ladies and gentlemen who are enjoying the healthful pleasure of a drive without being annoyed by the dust, confusion and bad thoroughfares of the ordinary highways. Heretofore Wilmington has stood alone in this respect and has had no such convenience for pleasure in her vicinity, further than that afforded by the excellent turnpike to the Sound. It is now intended to supply this demand for a good place in which to indulge in the pleasures of a buggy or horseback ride, and several public spirited gentlemen of the city have inaugurated a movement by which a nice driving park will soon be established. Several hundred dollars have already been subscribed towards the enterprise and, while as yet there is no permanent organization, a committee has been appointed to select a suitable location for the park and to see upon what terms the requisite amount of land can be obtained. This committee will report at an early day, and then the matter will be put into tangible shape and the work pushed forward to completion as rapidly as circumstances will permit.

Such a place, suitably laid out and properly managed, will have a direct tendency to bring many people to our city, and especially so at the time of the races. It will also have a tendency to introduce a better quality of horses. The people who come here on such occasions will, as a matter of course, bring money with them, much of which will be necessarily circulated in the city to the benefit of our citizens. Hence it becomes important to our business men, who desire the prosperity of the city, and who would be the most benefited by the establishment of such a place, to do all in their power in furtherance of the enterprise. The park, we are assured, will certainly be established. Of that fact there is no doubt. There may be a little delay in consequence of hesitancy on the part of some to respond with alacrity, but it will be built nevertheless. It is hoped that there may be no such cause for delay as we have hinted, but that all will contribute to make it a complete success.
