Each guest or family can have a separate tent, pitched in a grove overlooking the sea, and provided with the rude furniture of a camp; but there is also a wooden hotel, in which an ordinary apartment is assigned to every visitor, for refuge in case of storm or sudden dislike of the canvass. Meals are served in a general dining room, or in tents, as desired; and the bills of fare include the primitive dishes of campers as well as the products of French cookery.

Big Showers.

We are informed that there were very heavy showers yesterday afternoon on the line of the Wilmington & Weldon Railroad, and that in some places, especially in the vicinity of Warsaw, the rain poured in torrents, completely flooding for awhile the lowlands. We hear of no damage, however, resulting to person or property in that section from lightning.

Last Night's Lecture.

There was a very small audience at Germania Hall last night to listen to Mr. M. Bachrach's lecture upon his "Travels in Siberia." The lecture was delivered in the German language and was quite interesting to those who heard it. He spoke from a knowledge obtained by actual observation and experience in that inhospitable country, having been sent there as a prisoner for political offenses.
