His favorite book, as a boy, was Charles O'Malley. His mother died over a year ago. His father has been dead several years. One of his requests was that he should be allowed to sit up and not die in bed.

He leaves three sons and one daughter—Fred, U. S. S. Jessie and Nellie, all married—and eight grandchildren. His last public speech was at Ocean Grove a year ago before the Christian Commission.

When a boy, if he ever went beyond a place, he never reached his foot, but took a roundabout tour to reach his destination some other way. He often said he attributed his success to a resolution taken in youth, to "never turn back" in any undertaking.

Gen. Grant smoked his last cigar on the 30th of November, 1884. In a letter to a friend mentioning the circumstance, he said he had smoked many thousands of cigars, and they had been his greatest comfort through the last years of the war on the battlefield.
