LOCAL NEWS.

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Oysters this month.
The moon enters on its last quarter at 1 o'clock to-night.
We lose this month 64 minutes of daylight.
This month has five Tuesdays and five Wednesdays.
The receipts of cotton at this port to-day foot up 50 bales.

This cool weather will bring many of the Summer absentees home.

September is the first Fall month, and it has dawned upon us literally as such.
At 3 o'clock this afternoon the thermometer in this office registered 84 degrees.

There was no City Court this morning. Every one seems to be bent on good behavior.
Nor barque *Insular Capra*, Daniel, sen, from this port, arrived at Liverpool last Saturday.
The band of the Standard Dramatic Company paraded our streets this morning and played some very fine music.

Fruit growers will find an interesting article on the curculio bug, on the fourth page of this issue, from the pen of Capt. R. P. Paddison.
The steamship *Gulf Stream*, from New York, arrived at her wharf in this city at about half-past 11 o'clock this forenoon, promptly on time.
There will be a match game of baseball at the Seaside Grounds to-morrow afternoon between two well-matched juvenile clubs, the Somersets and the Amateurs.

After some very threatening weather and heavy rains yesterday, it began to clear off towards night and this morning was full of sunshine and as pleasant as could be desired.

Capt. F. M. James informs us that there were eleven interments in Oak Grove Cemetery for the month of August. Of this number four were adults and seven were children. Two adults were white and all the remainder were colored.

There is a great demand in Charleston, S. C., for tin roofers, and we learn that several have gone there from this city. In the recent hurricane there nearly all of the buildings which were covered with tin were unroofed—hence the demand.
Auctioneer Price, corner of Market and Second streets, has in store a large number of both handsome and useful articles which are being sold by him at auction on commission. There was a sale this morning and a large attendance and there will be another special sale to-morrow night.

The sidewalk on the East side of Seventh street, near the corner of Market, is excellent in dry weather, but is a nuisance after a shower. It is considerably lower than the place where the gutter ought to be, and after every rain is nearly over shoes in water. The trouble could be easily remedied.

Cotton.
The receipts of cotton at this port for the month ended August 31st, 1885, foot up 132 bales as against 117 bales for the corresponding month last year, an increase of 15 bales. The receipts for the crop year ended August 31st, 1885, foot up 94,054 bales against 91,701 bales for the corresponding time last year, an increase this year of 2,353 bales.

Harbor Master's Report.
From the books of Capt. Joseph Price, Harbor Master, we find the following as the vessels which arrived during the month ended August 31st, 1885:
American—4 steamers, 3,684 tons; 17 schooners, 3,923 tons; making a total of 21 vessels and 7,642 tons.
Foreign—6 barques, 2,437 tons, and 2 brigs, 482 tons, making a total of 8 vessels and 2,919 tons, and a grand total of 29 vessels aggregating 10,561 tons.

Tableaux and Music.

Exports Foreign.
The exports foreign from this port for the month ended August 31st, 1885, as taken from the books at the Custom House, foot up as follows: Spirits turpentine, 249,312 gallons, valued at \$84,687; rosin, 12,992 barrels, valued at \$13,464; lumber, 473,000 feet, valued at \$7,899; making a total of exports foreign amounting to \$106,050.

The September Moon
Fulls on the 24th, at 54 minutes after 2 o'clock in the morning. On the 3rd, the day of the last quarter, at 9a. 27m. p. m., the moon is in conjunction with Saturn, being 4 deg. 17 min. south. On the 5th at 1h. 28m. p. m., she is in conjunction with Mars, being 5 degrees 33 min. south. On the 7th, at 10h. 12m. p. m., she is in close conjunction with Mercury, being no degrees 37 minutes north. On the 8th, at 5h. 55m. p. m. the new moon is in conjunction with Jupiter when about an hour old, and only five minutes before Jupiter's conjunction with the sun. The moon is at the time 1 degree 57 minutes south. On the 9th, at 6h. 34m. p. m., the moon is very close conjunction with Uranus, being 4 minutes south. On the 11th, at 5h. 28m. a. m., she is in conjunction with Venus, being 2 degrees 27 minutes north. On the 28th, at 3h. 7m. a. m., she is in conjunction with Neptune, being 2 degrees 51 minutes south.

A Good Man Gone.
A correspondent at Excelsior, in Brunswick county, writes us of the death, near that place, on the night of Saturday, the 22d inst., of Mr. Benj. Lewis Butler, a highly respected and prominent citizen of Brunswick county. He says:
"The deceased was about 48 years of age, leaving an aged father and a wife and two children, having lost five children only two years ago by that alarming disease, diphtheria. Mr. Butler was a faithful soldier during the late war, having been one of the first to respond to his country's call. He was true to the Stars and Bars through all the hardships, dangers and privations of war, even to Appomattox, when our illustrious chieflain yielded his sword and our once proud banner trailed in the dust of defeat. With the remnant of that grand army the subject of this sketch returned to the quiet of home to live the life of the private citizen. He for several years filled the position of Commissioner of Brunswick county and also that of justice of the peace, both of which were filled in a manner highly creditable to himself and to his county. In all the relations of life he was high toned and respected, and few lives are more regretted by the circle of friends and acquaintance in which they lived."
