There was a very singular and menacing cloud formed in the heavens at 6 o'clock last night and many of our citizens were considerably alarmed lest we should be visited by one of those terrible cyclones which have recently devastated some portions of the North.

The kitchen in rear of the Northwest corner of Fifth and Chestnut streets has been bought of Mr. H. Bloom by Daniel Howard, colored, and was being removed this morning to Sixth street, between Mulberry and Walnut, where it will be fitted up as a dwelling.

Carpenters, masons and painters are having about as much as they can well attend to these days. Several buildings in different sections of the city are in course of construction, some are being remodeled and others repaired, so that the demand for mechanics leaves no reasonable excuse for idleness.

Sale of Real Estate. The Cape Fear Mill property was sold at auction at the Courthouse door this forenoon. It was bought by Mr C. B. Wright for \$15,050. The dwelling house of Mr. Alex. Oldham was sold at the same time and place and was bought by the First National Bank for \$2,700.

Bright Leaf.

We saw a fine specimen of bright leaf yellow tobacco today which was raised by Mr. George E. Shepherd at his place on Topsail Sound, 21 miles from the city. It was cured by what is known as the blue process, and it was pronounced by competent judges to be of very good quality. Mr. Shepherd planted one acre in tobacco this year as an experiment, and is very much gratified at the success which has attended his efforts thus far, and he will probably increase the area of tobacco culture on his place next year.

Yom Kippur.

The next Jewish festival, that of Yom Kippur, the Day of Atonement, which begins at sunset to-morrow and ends at the same hour on Saturday, teaches that he who has fallen may stand erect and straight after he has risen again; the sinner may return to the path of righteousness and be pious; he who deserts the straight path and chooses crooked by-ways may return to the level path and walk in it; pride, vanity, haughtiness, sinfulness and wickedness will not harden the immutable Deity, but blight souls and lead to forgetfulness of duties; God punishes for the sake of correction. Yom Kippur is a day to be devoted entirely to making atonement before God for sins; to sanctify and elevate moral natures to God, and to be reminded of the everlasting Sabbath in the world of spirits; to declare the dominion of the spirit over the body, by abstaining from all earthly enjoyment, and letting the mind be occupied exclusively with holy thought, which is the true Sabbath of the soul.

Chamber of Commerce.

A called meeting of the Executive Council of the Chamber of Commerce was held at the rooms of the Produce Exchange this forenoon.

The President, Hon. A. H. VanBokkelen, called the meeting to order, and after the transaction of some preliminary business, reported verbally that the unexpended funds from the last Congressional appropriation for the Cape Fear would give a width of 110 feet at the Upper Channel; 150 feet at Log Shoal, and from 110 feet to 150 feet at Snow's Marsh, with a depth of 16 feet at low water from Wilmington to Smithville and 18 feet at ordinary tides and 20 feet on full tides over the bar.

The President then submitted his resignation in the following communication:

WILMINGTON, N. C., Sept. 17th, 1885.

To the Executive Council of the Chamber of Commerce, Wilmington, N. C.:

GENTLEMEN: I tender my resignation as President of this Chamber of Commerce, to take place at the annual election, which will be held on Thursday, 8th October next.

Said position has been held by me the past nine years, during which time I have endeavored to advance the commercial interests of this city and State, and regret that greater increase of commerce and general prosperity have not resulted.

Uncertainty as to my future renders my resignation at this time proper.

Whether located here or elsewhere, or in what employment I may be engaged, a portion of my own time will ever be at the service of "dear old Wilmington," and her interests always considered. I am, dear sirs,

Resolved, That the Executive Council of the Chamber of Commerce of the City of Wilmington, N. C., receive, with feelings of deep regret, the resignation of their President, A. H. VanBokkelen, to take effect from and after their annual meeting on 8th October next; who has long and usefully served in that office, and who has done so much to enhance the progress and prosperity of our city, and that we wish him every success and happiness in the future.

On motion, the Secretary was authorized to give the proceedings to the daily papers as an item of news.
