President Cleveland has written a letter to Henry J. Tilford, of Louisville, Ky., saying that he appointed W. B. Fleming associate judge in Mexico upon his (Fleming's) merits.

The Republican clerks in Washington, from Ohio, are being urged by Senators Sherman and others to go home and vote. They are not responding with the readiness heretofore shown.

A meeting of the Independent Political Union Club (colored), was held in Alexandria last Wednesday evening and was well attended. A letter from Major S. P. Bayley was read and endorsed, and a resolution condemning and denouncing General Mahone's platform and his administration was also adopted.

The New York Herald figures the cost of living for the average young man in that city as follows: Apartments, \$400; breakfast and dinner \$500; club dues, \$50; clothing, \$300; and sundry small expenses for necessities and amusement swell the figures to the round sum of \$1,500.

A special from Bowling Green, Mo., says Capt. Thomas H. Rootes died at Bowling Green, Mo., on the 7th inst., in the 76th year of his age. He was for more than thirty years a United States naval officer, and accompanied Commodore Perry on his expedition to Japan. Capt. Rootes served in the Confederate navy during the war.

Mr. Levi P. Morton has determined to present to the City of Newport, R. I., a tract of land known as "Dead Hill," containing about thirteen acres for the use of the citizens for a public park. Mr. Morton's gift is a munificent one, the land for ordinary purposes being valued at about \$60,000. It is said that other citizens have determined to purchase the polo ground adjoining, ten acres, and add it to Mr. Morton's gift.

Norfolk Virginian: Zeb Vance, of North Carolina, who has befriended and defended Virginia ever since she has been without a United States senator, has been compelled to decline invitation to speak to the Democracy in Halifax county, but says: "I give it to an old politician's opinion that General Lee will be elected by a majority of many, many thousands, and that Virginia is about to resume, for good and all, her ancient position in the South as the bulwark of true Democracy."

Cardinal McCloskey died on Saturday morning, at 10 minutes to 1 o'clock, in the archiepiscopal residence on Madison Avenue, in New York, just opposite the great cathedral. He became unconscious at 4 o'clock in the afternoon and so remained until the end. The New York Herald, in speaking of his death says:
There is no word to be said of Cardinal McCloskey that is not to his honor. An American born, he rose by the power of his personal qualifications to the highest dignities of the Church to whose service he devoted a life of unremitting conscientious endeavor. Despite the temptation which might well assail one occupying his position of rank and influence, it is to be said of him that he never disturbed the serenity of his purpose or marred his ecclesiastical work by interference in general public policy. His devotion was to his Church, and in his other relations he was simply an upright citizen and a Christian.

We have received from the publishers, Messrs. Latham, Alexander & Co., Cotton Commission Merchants of New York, their 12th annual report of cotton movements and fluctuations. The book is handsomely gotten up and contains 140 pages, all of which contain much of interest to the cotton planter, dealer and manufacturer. The present number embraces the movements and fluctuations in cotton since 1880 and these are brought up to August 31st, 1885, the close of the cotton year of 1884-85. The work covers every conceivable ground of interest to the cotton growth and trade and has been compiled evidently with the utmost care so as to make it entirely accurate in every particular. It contains many valuable and important tables which are convenient for reference, among which are the daily receipts at all ports and interior towns during the last cotton year.
