New York City is to spend \$1,000 for water pipes to be placed in its parks.

Jay Gould's family have an income of \$1,400,000 a year from their investment in Missouri Pacific Railroad stock.

The Archbishop of Canterbury has drawn up special prayers for use in his diocese with reference to the approaching general election in England.

It is proposed to strike out the words "Sicilium Reipublice Massachussettensis" from the seal of that State and substitute "The Seal of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts."

Thirty counties in Kansas have nominated Prohibition tickets, and it is expected that at least an equal number of Prohibition tickets will be chosen in additional counties.

The Harvard College annex, so-called, opened its seventh year on Monday with sixty-five young women enrolled. It now, for the first time, has a house of its own, and its endowment amounts to \$25,000.

The New York gubernatorial campaign brings on a renewal of silly attention to matters that have nothing to do with the issues. The war record of Governor Hill's brothers is one of the outside points which has caused discussion.

Senator Ruger, who prolonged the Senatorial fight in Illinois last Winter by his refusal to vote for Logan, in which he persisted until the last minute, revives the memory of that contest by threatening to expose the bribery there practiced. He says he was offered \$35,000 for his vote at one time, and \$50,000 to stay away from the final balloting.

A dispatch from Montreal says that it is stated there that the vacancy in the College of Cardinals created by the death of Cardinal McCloskey, of Quebec. When one of the Canadian bishops went to Rome some time ago in connection with the matter of the division of the diocese of Three Rivers Cardinal Simeoni pledged his word that in case of a vacancy occurring in the college he would use all possible means to have it filled by Archbishop Taschereau.

There is trouble ahead for Rev. Dr. Curry, who has been recently nominated as Minister to Spain. He is bitterly opposed by the Roman Catholics of Richmond. A special from that city to the New York Herald says:

The Catholic Visitor, of this city, the organ of the Catholics of Virginia, in its issue of to-day violently opposes the appointment of J. L. M. Curry, of this city, as Minister to Spain, and asks the Spanish government not to receive him because of his bitter denunciation of the Roman Catholic Church in an address delivered before a Baptist Convention held here in May, 1876, in which he said that "Romanism was worse than paganism." A report of this address has been extensively published and the Catholics are much incensed at the thought of being represented by a man whom they claim to be a bigot.

A thrilling tale is reported from Toronto, Ont. A special from that place dated last Saturday, says:

This evening, while the wife of Jean-Baptiste Romilly, a farmer residing near the village of St. Vincent de Paul, ten miles from here, accompanied by her two-year old child was feeling her hair, a large bald-headed eagle swooped down and bore the little one off in its talons. The child screamed from fright and held out its hands to its mother for assistance, but she was powerless to rescue it.

The neighbors turned out with shot-guns, but the only effect of their firing was to accelerate the eagle's flight. The bird alighted on top of a barn a mile away, and was seen to make several strokes at the child's head with its beak. The neighbors had got pretty close by this time, and succeeded in frightening the eagle away. The child's body was recovered, but life was extinct, a hole having been made in its skull and a portion of the brain devoured by the bird.

## Pender Items.

We have received the following from an esteemed correspondent and subscriber at Burgaw, Pender county:

**Mr. Error.**—Our little town is very healthy now, which is fortunate, as our people have but little money with which to pay doctors' bills. We are frequently having additions to our population, but the strangers are all so small in stature that it takes but little to feed them, although they demand a good deal of attention. All our people are busy. The farmers are bringing in their crops, which are abundant in this section. Our women are all most amiable in their dispositions and seldom quarrel except about their chickens, although some of the younger ones make a fuss about their sweethearts. A party of our townsmen went hunting a few days since and caught a fox and Mr. J. T. Collins killed a fine three-pronged buck. Mr. Collins is a good shot, having on a former occasion killed two deer out of three which were run out to him.

## City Court.

Mayor Bear had quite a full docket for his consideration this morning:

**Martha Wescott**, colored, charged with disorderly conduct, was required to pay a fine of \$5 or go below five days.  
**P. Murphy**, a stranger, was drunk and disorderly. He was extremely anxious to leave the city at once, but as he was discharged for the same offense yesterday, only to renew the drunk, he was sent below for 24 hours.  
**Solomon Stevenson**, colored, for disorderly conduct, was required to pay a fine of \$5 or go below four days.  
**Alfred Hill**, colored, charged with larceny, was discharged.  
**Henry Faison**, colored, was sent below until he could be examined by a physician. This is the case which was picked up in the street a few days ago, very sick, and subsequently sent to the hospital, from which he wandered away and was again arrested last night. He is evidently demented and can give no account of himself further than his name, and that he came from Wayne county.

## The Pender Robbery.

In our issue of the 12th inst. we chronicled the fact of the robbery of Mr. Aaron Lewis, in Pender county, in which there were several important errors, occasioned by the misinformation of our correspondent. The fact of the robbery remains as stated, but there were only three persons engaged, instead of four, and they were white men disguised by blacking their hands and faces. This was demonstrated by the fact that every article which they touched left the imprint of blacking. The robbers upon the same night stole a horse and buggy from J. B. Croom, Esq., which they drove down the "Negro Head" road to near this city, where the team was left and two of the robbers were seen to cross the bridge at the railroad at an early hour the next morning. That these were the robbers of Mr. Lewis is pretty well proven from the fact that a number of turpentine bills with Mr. Lewis' name upon them were found in the buggy. Suspicion points to two men who have not been seen in the county since the robbery, and another who yet remains in the county, as being the guilty parties, and every measure will be taken to secure them, establish their guilt and punish them.

## Opera House.

Gilbert and Sullivan's Japanese Comic Opera "The Mikado," (pronounced Mi-Ka-do, with the accent on the penult) was presented at the Opera House last night by the Bijou Opera Troupe, whose performances here last season won for them deservedly high praise. Their efforts last night were witnessed by a large, cultivated and appreciative audience whose unanimous verdict was that the troupe had fully maintained the prestige obtained last year. The company is small. So much the better as it gives the listener an opportunity to more accurately judge the merits of each performance as well as of the performance as a whole. The plot is intended as a satire on the follers of English life and words and music are very happily wedded, and by this troupe the ideas of the poet and composer are finely and faithfully rendered. The company never appeared to better advantage, the costumes, which were Oriental in style, were rich and beautiful, and the entire performance was given with spirit, precision and style that was delightful to every one present. Mikado will be repeated to-night and there is every indication that there will be a crowded house to greet and encourage this truly good musical and deserving company.
