**City Court.**  
The first case for the Mayor's consideration this morning was that of Josephine Smith, colored, charged with being drunk and disorderly last night over in Brooklyn. She was required to pay a fine of \$25 or be confined at hard labor for 30 days.  
Several cases of failure to pay license tax were settled by the payment of costs, others were given time in which to settle and one delinquent was ordered in custody of the Chief of Police until a settlement should be effected.

**Rival Railroad.**  
There has been recently a lively competition and some bitterness of feeling concerning the passenger rates between the Central Railroad of Georgia, the Western & Atlantic and the East Tennessee, Virginia & Georgia Railroad Companies, and as there seemed to be no probability that the dispute could be settled amicably the matter was referred to Mr. T. M. Emerson, President of the Southern Railway Passenger committee, who has issued the following:

"New York, November 11.—The question of a restoration of the competitive passenger rates, as between the Central Railroad of Georgia, the Western & Atlantic, and the East Tennessee, Virginia & Georgia Railroad Companies, having been submitted to me as President of the Southern Passengers' Association by the general passenger agents of the lines in interest, you will please restore to tariff rates, to take effect at 7 o'clock Saturday morning, Nov. 14th, all passenger rates comparative between the lines referred to the same to be strictly maintained pending the meeting in Atlanta on December 2nd next.
