A convention of the Knights of Labor at San Francisco Monday night adopted resolutions to systemize anti-Chinese movements in every city and town on the Pacific coast, and calling on labor organizations in the east to extend their sympathy. The customs report shows that since the Chinese restriction act of 1882, 18,000 Chinese have landed at San Francisco, nearly 4,000 of whom have been permitted to land without legal certificates.
