Charlotte Observer: Mrs. Susan Lavinia Johnson, daughter of Bartlett and Mrs. Susan Farney Shipp, of Lincoln county, N. C. and wife of Capt. V. Q. Johnson, died in San Antonio, Texas, on December 5th.
