The Legislature is fairly in session, the organization having been perfected yesterday. The Independents have ruled in the House Their nominees were supported by enough Republicans to give them a majority of two. Web s'er, a renegade Democrat from R ck ingham, has been elected Speaker and Richmond Pearson, another renegade Democrat, voted for him. North Car lina is Democratic by a clear majority of at least 40,000 and yet the control of legislation in the House is in the-hands of the Republicans and their allies, sim' ply because lots of people didn't go to the polis and vote

We spoke yesterday of the newly projected "Wilmington Sea-Coast Railroad," which we hope to see construct ed at an early day, but our remarks were necessarily brief. To day we can speak more extensively of it.

The enterprise has been projected by Mr. Iredell Meeres and seems to have met with the hearty co-operation and approval of many of our most prominent people. The capital stock is placed at \$100,000, in 1,000 shares of \$100 each, and the charter, which is for 199 years, is derived from a direct act of the Legislature.

The Directors are Messrs. James Sprunt, L. S. Belden, Wm. Larkins. G H. Smith, H. B. Short and Iredell Meares, who are named in the charter and who will serve for one year, or until their successors are appointed.

The estimated cost of the road, as figured on by Capt. Rod McRae, who has surveyed the route, is \$40,616.60 for read bed &c. and for equipment \$15, 000. This, with a margin on construction and equipment of \$4,386.40, brings the total cost up to \$60,000. For crossing the Sound on creosoted pilings the estimated cost is \$20,000, making, in all, a cost of \$80,000, which we look upon as a liberal estimate. The distance from the city to the Sound is said to be 8 miles direct and 94 miles o necessary length of tract. This, bow ever, we cannot understand. It is but 8 miles from the toll house on the jurnpike to Capti Manning's place on Wrightsville, and the turnpike track is a devious one, diverging at least one mile from a direct route. However, the cost of construction is based upon 10 miles and it is, we think, a very liberal one.

Now of this \$80,000, first cost, we understand that three-eighths of the amount (\$30,000) has already been subscribed and we feel sure that the balance will soon be forthcoming. As soon as \$50,000 is subscribed the construction of the road will probably be

As to the probable receipts and expenses: It is estimated that the entire operating expenses of the road will not cost exceeding \$12 000 per annum while the receipts from passenger traffic alone are estimated all of the way from 30,000 to 80,000 passengers per annum. This is based upon the travel over the turnpike last year which carried, it is estimated, from 22,000 to 30,000. 
