continue to drive them just the same, railroad or no railroad; and again, there are many drives on the road, estimated as passing over it, which are merely to Masonboro turnpike and return and are taken on a half ticket. Still we firmly believe that the expectations of its projectors as to the amount of travel will be more than realized.

The estimate on freight is a very modest one. The highest estimate from freight, mail and express is \$5,000 and the lowest \$2,000. We make the prediction here that if the road is constructed the receipts from freight in the second year will double that of the most excessive estimate now made. The reason for this is very plain. If the road is run to Sneeden's hammock (or hammock) as proposed, there will be found plenty of water from that point out of Wrightsville Inlet to New River, either by an entire or partial trip outside. This facility for inter-course with New River and the coast lands beyond that point would naturally breed a line of small steamers, which would soon become regular packets, as adjuncts of the road.

As for the advantages of Wrightsville as a Summer resort the subject is so old one and needs not enlarge upon here. We think that a road to Wrightsville and increased hotel accommodations there would insure a success for the line as well as many pecuniary advantages for our city in general. This will be done by drawing travel and traffic here from the interior of this State and South Carolina. Nor will it be necessary to draw upon the present river traffic to ensure the success of the road. It may as well be taken at once as an accepted fact that the road will not do all of the seaside business, but that the turnpike and the river will have about as much as they can attend to, i. e. as long as the shell road is kept up to its present high standard and as long as Capt. Harper and the *Passport* boss, the business on the Cape Fear.

It is a happy conception and neatly gotten up, and is, no doubt, highly prized by the recipient.

Pender County Board of Health.

There was a regular meeting at Burgaw on Monday, the 3d inst. of this Board. The attendance was large and full. The occasion was the election of officers for the next two years and the transaction of other important business. The following officers were elected: President—Dr. W. C. Murphy, Superintendent of Health—Dr. W. T. Ennett. Secretary and Treasurer—Dr. S. S. Satchwell. Dr. Satchwell, although unanimously elected to the office of Secretary and Treasurer, resigned, owing to other professional engagements, whereupon Dr. B. T. Sanders was elected to fill the position.

A communication was received from the Franklin County Medical Society, asking co-operation in a movement to memorialize the present legislature for a "Physician's Lien Law." It is held that the physicians of the State are a long-suffering, and heretofore neglected and oppressed, portion of the community, and as such entitled to legal protection, in the collection of their dues, as are mechanics and farm laborers. The Pender county physicians and other prominent citizens of that county heartily endorse this movement.

We are informed that the State Board of Health continues to be vigorously at work for the public health. Dr. S. S. Satchwell of Pender county, has been honored by the Board with a request to prepare a paper on the drinking water of Eastern North Carolina for the next conjoint session of the State Medical Society and State Board of Health. We learn that the doctor accepts the appointment.
