No News and Observer received at its office this morning.

Education is so liberally endowed in Greece that the Greeks are almost entirely in possession of the learned professions in Turkey. Illiteracy is rare in the country.

A Frenchman left an order in his will that five hundred thousand francs should be buried with him. A nephew was thoughtful enough to have a check for the amount put in the coffin.

It is estimated that it will cost \$4,000,000 to fix the boundary line between Alaska and British America, and commercial exchanges are protesting that the results would not be worth the money.

Mr. Henry Irving calculates that the residential theatre-going population of London numbers 800,000 and that 20,000 people enter London every day with money in their pockets to see the sights of the town and amuse themselves.

The carrier pigeon service in Paris is no more carefully organized and the latest census shows that there are 2,500 trained birds, which can take dispatches in and out of the capital in the roughest weather. Some are taught to go to the neighboring forts and towns, others to distant parts of the provinces.

There is no doubt as to the sentiment of a large majority of the Democrats of this State on the infernal revenue question. They favor either its absolute repeal or a decided reduction of the tax. The people of the middle and western portions of the State can have their own way in this matter.

Mr. Richmond Pearson seems to have declared against the present system of county government. If we are correctly informed Mr. Pearson declared during the campaign that he did not advocate the repeal of the system. Mr. Pearson will probably find other points soon on which he is in thorough accord with the Republicans.

A great deal of interest seems to center at this time on the Reagan Interstate Commerce bill. Powerful speeches were made against it yesterday in the Senate by Senators Platt, of New York, and Morgan, of Alabama. We do not know how the North Carolina Senators stand. We do not believe the bill will pass the Senate in its present shape.

The difficulty of sighting rifles in the dark in warfare has been ingeniously overcome by the use of luminous paint. A small luminous bead is clipped on to the rifle over the fore sight, and another over the rear sight, when used at night in reply to an enemy's fire, forming two luminous points. The English war office authorities have had these sights under trial for the past six months, and have now given their first order for some for the army.
