A Texas preacher predicts that the world will come to an end in ten years. Lord Tennyson will write the verses in honor of the little Bittberg babe.

The interesting section comes from Paris that in the past year the dogs there killed 1,700,000 rats. The coast of Norway is sinking gradually while that of Sweden is emerging more and more, and the Baltic is becoming shallower. Landmarks made on the Swedish coast by the celebrated naturalist Linnæus, at the beginning of the Eighteenth Century, show that the upheaval raises that coast about four feet in the course of a century.

A car called the "paper" now goes over the New York Central road at given periods. It is provided with a tank of colored fluid, and when the wheels roll over a rough place in the track the fluid is spilled on the spot. It is so arranged that the track superintendent can, while seated on the inside of the car, view the track and thus detect any flaw that may exist.

The New York Herald is doing a big thing in sending out its special last mail train from New York to Washington. The train leaves New York at 2:30 and reaches Washington City at 8 o'clock. The other New York papers reach that city in the afternoon. The train costs the Herald \$2,500 a week. On Friday morning it made one mile in 52 seconds another in 53 seconds, a third in 56 and a fourth in 57 seconds.

If the number of families in New York which hire their rooms from month to month be taken to be between 150,000 and 175,000, then over one-tenth of these families have been turned out of their homes during the past year. The records of the eleven District Courts prove it. Four District Courts alone will show that they have issued some 10,000 dispossession summons, each one of which was a notice to a family to pay up or go.

Mrs. Cleveland now uses note paper and envelopes ornamented with the United States shield in the national colors at the head of the paper and on the seal of the envelopes substituting gold for the white stripes. Across the shield are two diagonal bars, on the upper one "The White House" and on the lower one "Washington, D. C." in small letters of gold. The whole device is scarcely larger than a silver dime.

According to the London Life the German Empress has for many years been under a "massage" treatment. It is administered by an old woman of the Silesian peasantry, now more than 70 years of age, who travels with the Empress, has her entree everywhere, assists at all the court ceremonies from some quiet corner, and is allowed to bring her daughter to the palace to see her, rather than that she should absent herself for a journey to her native place.

In Good Order. As was announced last week, a general alarm was sent out from box 14 precisely at noon today, for the purpose of testing the efficiency of the fire alarm system. There was some excitement on the streets for a few moments, as some thought there was a fire in reality; but it soon subsided when it was seen that the firemen paid but little attention to the matter. The test was entirely satisfactory and showed that the system was in complete working order. In this connection, it has been suggested that, instead of sending out a regular alarm once a week, it would be better to strike the bell 12 times daily at precisely noon. By this means there would be a certainty of the good working order of the system, and the hour of the day would be determined at the same time.

Slight Fire.

An alarm of fire was sent out from box 24 at about 7:30 o'clock this morning. The cause of the alarm was the discovery of fire on the roof of Messrs. C. S. Love & Co's office, on South Water street, which had caught from sparks from the steamer *Cape Fear*, which was lying at the dock near by. The flames were extinguished before any damage was done.

Miss Turlington.

Mr. W. J. Young, principal of the institution for the deaf, dumb and blind, says Sunday's *News and Observer*, yesterday received a letter from Rev. Job Turner, a deaf mute preacher of Staunton, Va., in which he gives a conversation between himself and Miss Turlington while on a visit here last December. The conversation shows the confidence and love she reposed in Walter Bigham, and the high esteem in which she was held by people in other States. The following are extracts from the letter:

"On the day of my taking leave of you all, Miss Turlington asked me at the breakfast table whether I would like to marry her and her lover next summer, which surprised me not a little, and to which I replied in the affirmative. She said that he wanted to marry her at Christmas, but that she preferred 'next summer.' I told her that I would like to know the lover's name, but she declined to give it. Then she made me promise not to let anybody know it. I had no idea who her lover was, until the terrible news of the tragedy reached me, when I was greatly surprised to find out who her intended husband was.

She requested me to conduct a service in Wilmington, N. C., next summer for her benefit and that of her deaf mute friends, which I promised to do, to her great joy. A few minutes before leaving your school, she took me to her room to see the deaf mute girls sewing. They seemed to be much devoted to her. I told them to do what she commanded them to do, and they all replied yes. They were all happy and industrious at that time. Nobody deprecates her usefulness more than I. I have always had a high opinion of her as a lady, teacher and Christian. I cannot too much sympathize with you all and also the institution."
