In his annual report to the New York Legislature, Mr. Charles F. Peck cou mis ioner of the bureau of labor statistics, puts the number of strikes in New York State between November 1, 1885. and November 1, 1886, at 1,900. From 1 238 establishments be has received complete or partial returns, and he reports that of these 1,238 strikes, 723 were successful, 378 unsuccessful, while the result in 121 cases is still in doubt. The further statistics of strikes, as presented in Commissioner Peck's report, are interesting. The number of people employed in the establishments represented by the 1,238 strikes was 140 883, of whom 99,696 went on strike. while 41 787 remained at work. Of the strikers, 5,769 lost their places as the result of their action. These figures do not include the losses of place by the striking employees of the Third avenue street railroad company. The total loss of wages by the strikes of 1886 is not computed by the commissioner; but he states that the direct gain in increase of wages as the result of the 723 successful strikes amounted to \$937,079. There were 331 strikes for increase of pay, 244 of them succeeding and 87 railing. On the other hand, of the 256 strikes for re




