The Senatorial struggle in Texas has not reached its conclusion. Mr. Key, it is said, will withdraw in favor of Gov. Ireland, thus leaving the way open to two candidates, Ireland and Reagan. It is thought that Reagan will succeed.

The New York Star has information to the effect that the Senatorial deadlock in the Indiana Legislature is broken by Representative Robinson, who has promised to vote for Purdie, Democrat. If this is so it will ensure that gentleman's election.

An attempt was made on Monday morning to wreck the steamship *Guy* at the Old Dominion line, by means it is believed, of dynamite. When off Long Branch a terrific explosion occurred in the closets, which caused such damage to the vessel that Capt. Kelley, her commander, deemed it best to put back to New York.

We are glad to see that the House committee to whom the matter was referred have reported adversely on the Senate bill to pension the widows of Gen. Blair and Logan. The contrast to this is the bill introduced yesterday by a Massachusetts Republican to pension Walt Whitman. There is no civil list in this country and there should be none.

The following is clipped from the New York *Herald*. It is from a Washington City special to that paper:

Chaplain Milburn, shortly after the advent of Secretary Whitney's last daughter was known to him, prayed for Mrs. Whitney and the babe in his prayer one morning when the House of Representatives was beginning its session for the day. This caused a member of the House who has an infant daughter about the age of little Miss Whitney to remark that he considered the chaplain showed "offensive partiality" because he had not prayed also for his wife and baby. So next day the omission was remedied. These probably furnish the first precedents for similar official action, or any, in the halls of Congress upon the birth of any American citizen. Both the babies prayed for last week being girls, another triumph is scored for the cause of women.

Mr. John Mintz was the groom and Miss Amelia Hewitt was the blushing bride. They are both subject to fits, but not simultaneously until yesterday, when they thought fit to get married. They had not a cent with which to procure a license, but this obstacle was overcome through the kindness of some of the citizens, who "chipped in" enough to pay the necessary tax to the State and county, and the Register of Deeds contributed his share of the fee. The bride didn't know her precise age, but stated that she was just as old as "Bud John," which was considered near enough. Their bridal chamber last night was in Smithville jail, which was charitably granted them for "one night only." To-day they were taken back to their former quarters in the Poor House.

Mortuary Report.

Dr. F. W. Potter, city physician, has submitted his mortuary report for the month of January, 1887, from which we learn that deaths during that time were as follows:

White males, 7; white females, 4; total 11. Of this number 9 were adults and 2 were children.

Colored males, 17; colored females, 12; total, 29. Of this number 13 were adults and 16 were children.

The foregoing makes a grand total of 40 deaths during the month, 22 of which were adults and 18 were children.

Literary.

Meteorological Report.

Sergt. W. H. Fallon, who is in charge of the signal office here, kindly furnishes us with the following meteorological summary for the month of January, 1887:

Mean barometer, 30.121; highest barometer, 30.578, on the 27th; lowest barometer, 29.667, on the 1st; monthly range of barometer, 0.911; mean temperature, 41.2; highest temperature, 73.0, on the 22nd; lowest temperature, 14.6, on the 19th; monthly range of temperature, 58.4; greatest daily range of temperature, 34.6, on the 28th; least daily range of temperature, 6.8, on the 5th and 8th; mean daily range of temperature, 19.3. Prevailing direction of wind, South-west; total movement of wind, 6164; highest velocity and direction, 34 miles, North-west, on the 24th. Total rainfall, 3.30 inches.

The Baptists.

The Union meeting of the Eastern Baptist Association, which was held at Willard, Pender County, last week, was largely attended and was an important as well as interesting occasion. There were twelve Baptist preachers present. The opening sermon was preached by Rev. J. L. Stewart, of Clinton, and sermons were also preached by Revs. Messrs. Pope, Curtis, Tolson, Harrel and Rev. Dr. Pritchard. The Union being regarded as too large, it was divided into three sections, as follows: The Southern section comprehends 18 churches in New Hanover, Bladen and Pender Counties; the Western section comprehends 12 churches in Duplin and Sampson counties, West of the Wilmington & Weldon Railroad; and the Eastern section comprehends 17 churches in Duplin and Onslow counties, East of the Wilmington & Weldon Railroad.

The next session of the Southern section of the Association will be held at the church at Masonboro on the fifth Sunday in May next, at which Rev. W. M. Kennedy is appointed to preach the opening sermon, with Rev. G. M. Tolson as alternate.

Next Week.

A week more of pleasant theatrical entertainment is offered to our people by the Cora Van Tassel Dramatic Company.
