It is said that the supply of oysters in Virginia waters this year is larger and the quality better than for some years.

An order has been received by a firm in Lyons, France, from London for 2,500,000 pocket-handkerchiefs with Queen Victoria's picture on them, for the occasion of her coming "golden jubilee."

It is of some interest to know what percentage of the weather predictions made at Washington prove true. The last monthly report received shows that the predictions, issued three times a day, amounted to 9,626 during the month. Of these, 770, or 8 per cent., are considered to have failed entirely, 608, or 6.32 per cent., were one fourth verified; 1,665, or 17.30 per cent., were one-half verified; 1,661, or 17.29 per cent., were three-fourths verified, and 4,919, or 51.10 per cent., were fully verified. The predictions are based on scientific facts and framed with scientific care, but the conditions are so various that it would be unreasonable to expect absolute accuracy.

The report of President Battle, of the State University to the board of trustees, shows that the University is of great benefit to poor young men. There are now at the institution, Dr. Battle says, more than a hundred youths, "with hands brown with toil, some cooking for themselves, others hiring their own cooks, some on county appointments free of tuition, others going into debt for it, with threadbare clothes, in the coldest weather without greatcoats, hovering over scanty fires, but with the flames of noble resolutions burning in their breasts."

The chief topic in the Italian literary journals is Verdi's new opera, which will be produced in Milan this month. It consists of four short acts. The scene is laid in Venice and Candia. The symphony is a tempestuous poem, and the love songs are magnificent. A serenade in the opening scene will be accompanied by four rows of old Italian guitars, which have not ceased to be deliciously new and charming. At the debut will be the Comte de Paris, Mme. Adam, M. Clemenceau, Mergnier, the millionaire Dreyfus, the directors of the Grand Opera of Paris and a host of other celebrities.

This is Sunday, and I have not yet received my Friday's REVIEW. Not since the war closed has there prevailed, in this entire section, such mail irregularities, and for a good long time in the past. Are such outrages to be tolerated? Who is to blame? Can no remedy be applied.

School Appropriations.

At the regular meeting of the County Board of Education, held yesterday afternoon, appropriations were made for the different schools for the next scholastic year. The amount per capita was \$1.30 and the sum of the appropriations was \$9,019.40, divided as follows:

Whites-District No. 1, \$1,419.60; No. 2, \$1,326; No. 3, \$75.40; No. 4, \$137.80; No. 5, \$172.90; No. 6, \$41.60; No. 7, \$78; No. 8, \$39; No. 9, \$33.80; No. 10, \$36.40, making a total for the white schools of \$3,360.59.
Colored-District No. 1, \$2,212.60; No. 2, \$2,081.30; No. 4, \$159.90; No. 5, \$393.90; No. 6, \$349.70; No. 7, \$88.40; No. 8, \$120.90; No. 9, \$52; No. 10, \$200.20, making a total for the colored schools of \$5,658.90. The total number of children of school age in the county is, whites, 2,535; colored, 4,353, making a total, white and colored, of 6,938.

Audit and Finance.

The regular meeting of the Board of Audit and Finance was held yesterday afternoon. Present: W. I. Gore, Chairman, and Messrs. Wm. Calder and R. J. Jones.

The following bills were approved: For current expenses, amounting to \$4,755.89; sinking fund, \$135.71; paving Mulberry street from North Water to Nutt, \$134.64; expenses committee on public buildings, \$60.

Board of Aldermen.

The Board met in regular monthly session at the City Hall last night. Present: Mayor Hall, and Aldermen B. Boney, C. B. Worth, McEachern and Hewitt.

The proceedings of the last meeting were read.

Alderman Giles moved to amend the minutes of the meeting of January 11th by inserting after Alderman Worth's resolution, the words "The resolution was accepted by Alderman Giles."

Alderman McEachern moved that, as an amendment, the minutes be approved. His motion was adopted.

Alderman B. Boney submitted the petition of the C. F. S. F. E. Co., with the endorsement of the Chief of the Fire Department. On motion the matter of the purchase of a new engine was ordered to lie over until the next fiscal year.

Also, a petition from W. S. F. E. Co., concerning payment of full amount of \$125 allowed for two months. Referred to committee on Fire Department.

Alderman Giles called the attention of the Board to the need of buildings at Price's Creek, for quarantine purposes, and moved that Dr. G. G. Thomas be heard on the subject.

Dr. Thomas appeared before the Board and asked co-operation in the efforts of the Quarantine Board in securing from the General Assembly an appropriation of \$7,000, for the purpose of securing necessary buildings.

Alderman B. Boney moved that the resolution of Alderman Giles offered at the meeting of January 11th, 1887, in the matter of the report of the Cape Fear & Yadkin Valley Railroad Commission be taken up.

The chair ruled that the motion was not in order, as he considered that the resolution of Alderman Giles had been withdrawn at that meeting.

Alderman McEachern moved to reconsider the vote on Alderman Boney's resolution as had at the meeting held January 11th. Adopted.

The Mayor stated that Alderman Boney's resolution, to refer the report of the Commissioners back to them for amendment, was before the Board.

Alderman Boney called for the eyes and noses on his resolution. Alderman B. Boney, Worth and McEachern voted no; Alderman Giles and Hewitt in the affirmative. The resolution was not adopted.

The resolution of Alderman Worth to accept and approve the report of the Commissioners was taken upon motion of Alderman Boney, and was voted down; Alderman Giles, Boney, Hewitt and Mayor Hall voting against it, and Alderman B. Boney, Worth and McEachern for it.

On motion of Alderman Worth, the resolution offered by Alderman Giles, to reject the report of the Commissioners, was taken up. It was also rejected. Ayes-Aldermen Giles and Hewitt. Noes-Aldermen B. Boney, Worth, McEachern.

On motion the following were appointed registrars for the ensuing city election:

A Gross Outrage.

The freight and passenger train which left Charlotte at 8:15 last night, on the Carolina Central Railroad, was thrown from the track when about two miles East of Matthews' Station, in consequence of one of the rails having been removed by some scoundrel. The engine was rolled down the embankment and two cars were thrown from the track. The engineer and fireman were slightly injured, but none of the passengers were hurt. The train was moving at a slow rate of speed at the time, which probably was the reason that a fatal accident to the engineer or fireman-or both-was prevented. On account of the accident the mail from Raleigh, due here this morning, did not arrive but will reach here on to-night's train. We know of but few crimes which we consider more cowardly, mean and infamous than that which caused this accident, and we trust that the scoundrel or scoundrels who perpetrated the act may be found out and then punished to the full extent of the law.

The Register of Deeds submitted his monthly report of fees received for marriage licenses for the month of January amounting to \$13.30.
