State Auditor's Report

We have received from the State Auditor, W. P. Roberts, his official report for the fiscal year ended Nov. 30th, 1886. It is an elaborate and comprehensive document, and evidently was prepared with great care. From it we learn that the aggregated value of real estate and personal property in the State amounts to \$202,893,502. The richest county in these properties is Wake, with \$9,080,688 to her credit, while the poorest is Dare, with \$259,004. The report also contains a full and complete exhibit of the receipts and disbursements on account of the State during the year.
