Bill.
Boston is catching up in the march of
modern improvement—she is enjoying
a full-blown street car strike with all
that that implies.
A German astronomer has found
reason for believing that the zodiacal
light and the aurora borealis result
from the reflection of sunlight by water
and ice.
If the newspapers throughout the
country are to be believed there are at
least forty persons who are sure to be
appointed on the Inter-State Commerce
Commission.

Verdi has been paid for his new
opera a bonus of \$8,000, and in addi-
tion will receive a royalty on each per-
formance of the opera throughout the
world. If he could have levied a cent
a tune on all the organ grinders who
have been butchering his "Travatore"
for all these years he would now be able
to buy a yacht.

It seems that Spain wants to get into
a "scrimmage" with Uncle Samuel,
but if this country fails to scare by
words the fight will be declared off and
body will be hurt. Some tiresome
and vague diplomatic correspondence
will probably ensue and that will be
the end of it.

The U. S. Senate has passed two
bills which aggregate an appropriation
of \$21,000,000 for coast defenses, naval
armor and armaments for fortifications
and cruisers. An appropriation would
now be in order to protect that vast
amount from the thieves who are ever
looking for a rich harvest whenever an
appropriation of that sort is made.

One of the most serious drawbacks
to railroad travel in Venezuela is grass-
hoppers. They are so numerous that
they literally cover the rails for miles,
and as they do not attempt to get out of
the way of the engine millions of them
are crushed under the wheels and
make the track so slippery that trains
are often brought to a standstill. It is
said that this grasshopper plague will
last for seven years.

Talking to a Chicago reporter, Justin
McCarthy said: "The American
whom I am most anxious to meet is
President Cleveland. I am told that
he is a most remarkable man." When
asked his opinion of the effect of
Cleveland's policy on Irish affairs he
said: "I can discover nothing in his
policy hostile to the Irish cause. He
seems to be quite as friendly to that
cause as Mr. Blaine."

The Ninth International Medical
Congress will meet in Washington on
Monday, September 5 next. The Senate
has passed an appropriation providing
for the expenses of the meeting. This
Congress, which meets in triennial con-
vance, met last in Copenhagen, and
was formally opened by King Chris-
tian. This ceremony, it is suggested,
will be performed by President Cleve-
land, as he has consented to be a patron
of the Congress. The patrons of the
United States, the Secretary of
State, the President of the Senate and
the Speaker of the House.

Undoubtedly one of the strongest
lobbies that ever infested the capitol at
Washington, D. C. is there now work-
ing to defeat the Anti-Mormon Bill.
They are persistent, in season and out
of season, and are backed by an almost
unlimited supply of money and by all
the power and influence of the entire
Mormon Church.

What can be the matter with so
many people who handle other people's
money? Another official, and a Bos-
ton, Mass. man at that, has gone
wrong. He resigned the position of
Clerk of the Criminal Municipal Court
a few weeks ago, an office that he had
held for twenty years, and it is now
found out that he is \$200,000 short in
his accounts, with the examination of
his books not yet completed.
