The recent strike in New York and Jersey City, by which nearly 90,000 men were thrown out of employment seems to have resulted in no material good to the strikers. Business which was effected by the strike is again assuming its normal condition, and the strike is virtually ended.

Nor. barque Nordsen, Nielsen, from Hamburg for this port, sailed from Grimsby Feb. 10th.

There were six interments in Pine Forest Cemetery this week, four adults and two children.

The Register of Deeds issued five marriage licences this week; two of which were for white, and three for colored couples.

The bill to incorporate the Carolina Fire Insurance Company, of Wilmington, having passed in both houses of the General Assembly, has become a law.

David Brown, colored, was arrested last night on suspicion and locked up. The Mayor, this morning, continued the case until Monday for a further investigation.

Indication.—For North Carolina, generally fair weather, with lower followed by higher temperature and winds becoming Northerly.

Personal.—Mr. Robert Henning, formerly a well known business man of this city, but now of Richmond, Va., is here and gave us the pleasure of a call this morning.

Lost Child.—The little three-years old daughter of Elsie Davis, colored, strayed away from her home on the corner of Fifth and Chestnut streets, at about 1 o'clock this afternoon, and had not been found at 4 o'clock. Her mother is anxious to find her, and it is hoped that any one who may see the child will return it or inform the mother of its whereabouts.

Cotton.—The receipts of cotton at this port for the week ended January 12 h, 1887, foot up 926 bales as against 1,578 bales for the corresponding week last year; a decrease of 652 bales. The receipts for the crop year to date foot up 138,102 bales, as against 88,740 bales for the corresponding period last year; an increase of 49,362 bales.

A Cold Wave.—The following telegrams have been received here from the signal office at Washington, D. C.: "WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb 11—6 P M—Hoist cold wave signal. The temperature will fall from 25 to 30 degrees by 7 o'clock a. m., Sunday.

Hard Luck.

It is undoubtedly a fact that last year's almost universal short crops, in Eastern North Carolina, together with the very low prices that have obtained for all farm products, have left the farmers in rather poor circumstances for the present year's work. In conversation with one of the most skilled farmers of Duplin County yesterday, we learned that absolute distress prevailed among many of the tillers of the soil of that section. He stated that many of the farmers in his vicinity were absolutely cramped for the necessary means with which to commence their Summer's work and that, should the coming crop year prove as disastrous as the last two, they would be completely ruined.

Exports Foreign.

Nor. barque Emma Parker, Larsen, cleared to-day for Antwerp with 350 bales cotton and 3 372 barrels rosin, valued at \$18,722, shipped by Messrs A. & S. Sprunt & Son, Nor. barque Monica, Johannessen, cleared for London with 2,572 barrels rosin, valued at \$2,300, shipped by Messrs Williams & Murchison, and 1 512 casks spirits turpentine and 1 000 barrels rosin, valued at \$28,762, shipped by Messrs Paterson, Downing & Co. Br. barque Arda, Kearon, cleared also for London, with 2,547 barrels rosin and 20 barrels gum thus, valued at \$2,150, shipped by Messrs Paterson, Downing & Co., and 1,000 barrels rosin, valued at \$989, shipped by Messrs Williams & Murchison, Schr. Hattie Turner, Keen, cleared for Port au Prince, Hayti, with 225,714 feet lumber and 100,000 shingles, valued at \$3,549.91, shipped by Messrs E. Kidder & Son, Schr. Belle Brown, Perry, cleared for Esjardo, P. R., with 111,384 feet lumber and 924 bundles shingles, valued at \$1,877.49, shipped also by Messrs E. Kidder & Son; making a total of exports foreign amounting to \$58,350.40.

Camille.

The Opera House was again crowded last night to witness the performance of the celebrated French drama, "Camille," by the Cora Van Tassel Company.
