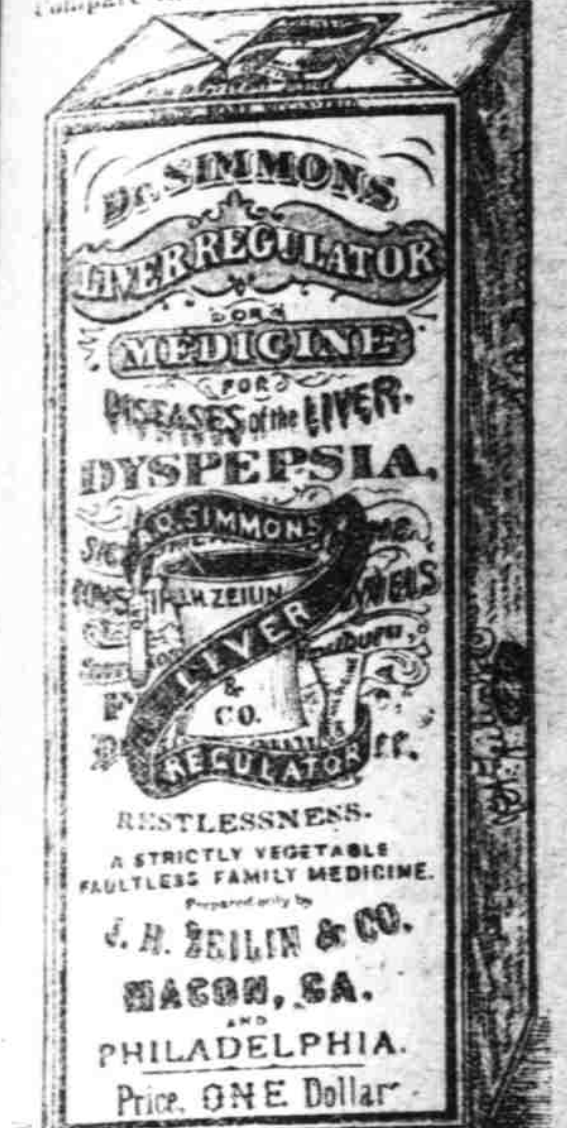

There is an immense contract for torpedo boats and other warlike crafts open in Spain. The Government of the Queen Regent intends to spend \$4,000,000 for the purpose of placing the Spanish fleet on a proper footing. The money is to be raised by the sale of certain Crown lands. Naturally this is a process which requires time, and therefore a syndicate has been formed to sell these lands.

Smith M. Weed, on whom the mantle of Democratic leadership in New York State seems to have been placed, and who received last month the vote of the Democratic members of the Legislature for United States Senator, declares in a public interview that in his opinion President Cleveland will not be a candidate for reelection, and that in proper time he will write a letter declining to be a candidate.

A Florida company engaged in the manufacture of perfumery has built a factory at Jacksonville, and next spring will start a 200-acre flower plantation. They now have one plantation at San Mateo, and are putting seven acres at Jacksonville in flowers. They have 5,000,000 flowering tube-rose bulbs, and a good many hundred thousand rose geraniums, in addition to which they buy all the roses, yellow jasmynes, orange blossoms, &c., that they can secure.

A society for the promotion of the higher education of women has been founded in Japan, under the presidency of the prime minister, and with the support of various influential foreign and Japanese gentlemen. Besides regular courses of instruction which will be provided, special courses of afternoon lectures will be delivered by the professors of the university. The whole institution will be under the control of a foreign lady, principal, assisted by two or more foreign lady teachers.

Mr. Alexander McArthur, of Winnipeg, has started off to go to the North Pole. He has taken with him a canvas boat, some provisions, a four-year supply of ammunition, and a drug clerk—and presumably some drugs, for of what use would the clerk be without them? He expects to get further supplies at York Factory, hunt musk-ox on Baffin's bay, and get in with the Eskimoes. Then he will take a dog train and hunt the pole. Col. Gilder has the start of him, but there is plenty of time, and it will be interesting to see which one reaches the world's pivot first.
