**STATE NEWS.**

**Greensboro News:** Mr. Wallace Nichols, Superintendent of the Fisher and Mills Hill Mining Co., whose property is located a few miles south of Greensboro, brought to the city yesterday, as the result of 6 days' work, 100 ounces of pure gold.

**Charlotte Observer:** Yesterday morning Mr. A. R. Erwin, commonly known among his acquaintances as "Art" Erwin, died very suddenly at his home in Steel Creek township, twelve miles south-west of Charlotte. The cause of his death is supposed to have been heart disease. Early in the morning he went out on his farm to look after some of his employes, when he was taken suddenly ill. He returned to his house, laid down on a bed, and died in a few minutes.

**News and Observer:** Yesterday morning in the First Baptist church in this city, Mr. J. S. Price and Miss Nellie Williamson, daughter of Capt. B. P. Williamson, were united in marriage by Rev. J. L. White, pastor of the church. — The Board of Directors of the R. & G. and R. & A. A. L. railroads met at their office in this city yesterday. It is rumored that to-day the matter of immediately extending a railroad from Monroe to Atlanta will be fully discussed. If the road should be built, Raleigh would be placed on a through line from North to South.

**Durham Plant:** Mr. Luther Clegg, of Chatham, was in Durham last Friday. Returning home his horse took fright, became unmanageable and after a short struggle threw him heavily to the ground, bruising his body and making a terrible wound on the crown of his head, or as our informant said, "knocking the top of his head off." Though so severely wounded, Mr. Clegg on Sunday afternoon was even better than his physician and friends dared to hope. His mind was clear and his conversation cheerful. He is in his 78th year and will probably recover.

**Charlotte Observer:** The committee appointed by the Academy of Medicine, of this city, to make arrangements for a banquet on the occasion of the meeting of the Medical Society, at this place in April, has closed a contract with the proprietors of the Central Hotel, and the visiting doctors will have an opportunity to see what Charlotte can do in the way of entertaining visitors. It is supposed that the attendance upon the association will be very large, and arrangements have been made to spread a board that will accommodate 250 or 300 people.

**Rockingham Rocket:** A correspondent at Gibson's Mill writes us that a little son of Mrs. M. R. McDonald performed a feat in pedestrianism that is worthy of record. The boy, aged about 13 years, was admitted to the orphan asylum at Oxford a few months ago, as was a younger brother. On Monday, the 28th of February, the older boy ran away from the asylum and arrived at home on Friday March 4th, having travelled the entire distance—about 200 miles—on foot in five days, and without any food whatever during the entire trip. He walked the railroad track—hence could not get lost—and slept in the woods at night. He was completely exhausted when he arrived at home, and was quite sick for several days.

**Newbern Journal:** The cold winds which prevailed Monday and Monday night damaged the pea crop on light land considerably. A close observer thinks the damage is about one third. 
